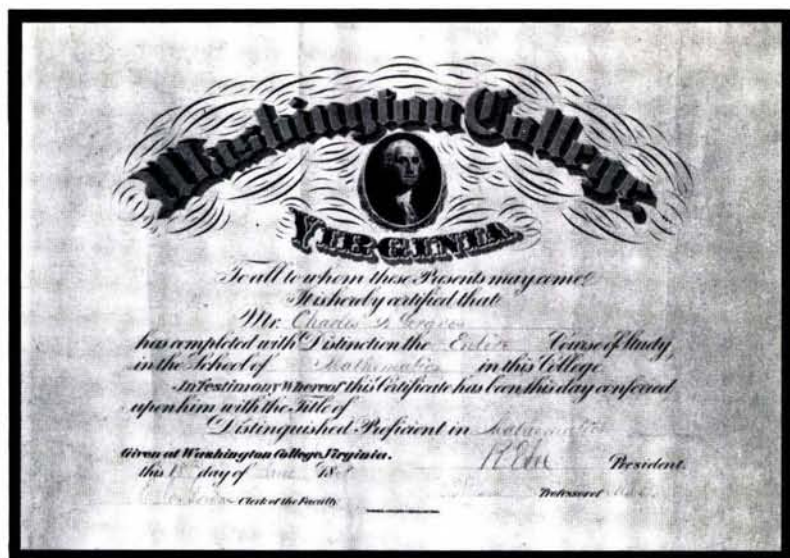

Conditions of Sale for Autographs

The property described in this catalogue will be offered at public auction by Robert A. Siegel Auction Galleries, Inc. ("Galleries") on behalf of various consignors and itself or affiliated companies. By placing a bid on any lot, the bidder acknowledges acceptance of and will be bound to these Conditions of Sale.

1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. **The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 10% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax or use tax which may be due on the sale.**

2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute between bidders, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.

3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for any errors in the execution of such bids.

4. **Lot numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to one or more of the following conditions:** (i) the lot is subject to a minimum final bid ("reserve"), below which it will not be sold, (ii) the Galleries have advanced monies to the seller and have a financial interest in the lot, (iii) the Galleries have guaranteed the seller a minimum sale price, and (iv) the Galleries may have ownership interest in the lot, either in part or whole. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without reserve.

5. Any lot, the description of which is obviously incorrect, is returnable, but only if the lot is returned within 14 days of receipt. All disputed lots must be returned intact with the original packing material. **The following lots may not be returned for any reason: Lots containing ten or more items; lots from buyers who have registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; any lot described with "faults" or "defects" may not be returned because of any fault or defect.**

6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within three days from the date of sale. The Galleries retain the right to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder.

7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within seven days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than thirty days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter.

8. All lots are sold as genuine. **Any lot proven to be other than genuine by a competent authority may be returned for a refund of the purchase price and buyer's premium. The Galleries shall have no additional liability under any circumstances.**

9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.

10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.

11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots, and agrees to pay for all out-of-pocket costs incurred in shipping.

Terms and Abbreviations Used in Descriptions of Autographs

Definition of Terms

Autograph Letter Signed (ALS): A complete or large part of manuscript letter with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Typed Letter Signed (TLS): A mechanically typed letter with the autograph signature of the person identified.

Letter Signed (LS): A manuscript letter written in another hand, which bears the autograph of the person identified.

Autograph Document Signed (ADS): A manuscript document with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Document Signed (DS): A document, either printed or in another's hand, which bears the autograph signature of the person identified.

Autograph Endorsement Signed (AES): An endorsement with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Autograph Note Signed (ANS): A note or endorsement with signature, entirely in the hand of the person identified.

Signed: The autograph signature of the person identified, unless otherwise indicated (autopen, secretarial signature, etc.)

Condition

Documents and letters should be expected to have folds, staple holes or minor defects caused by previous mounting. Photographs may have creases at corners or mount remnants on back. **Such faults will be described when they affect the text or signature.**

Estimates

Estimates have been provided as a guide to bidding. Lots may realize more or less than the printed estimates. Reserves, where they exist, will not exceed the estimate.

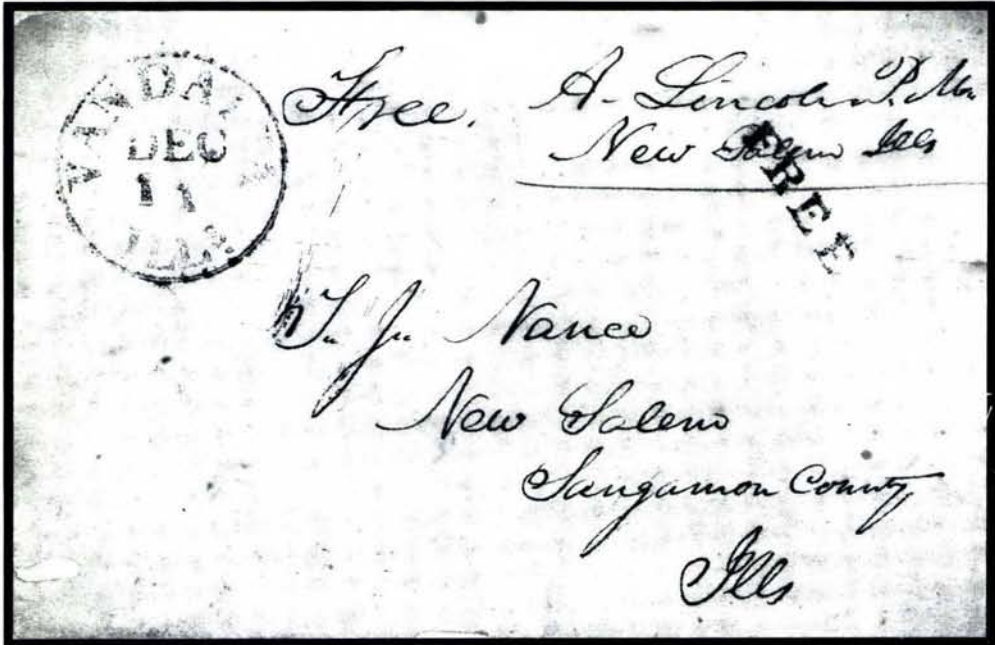

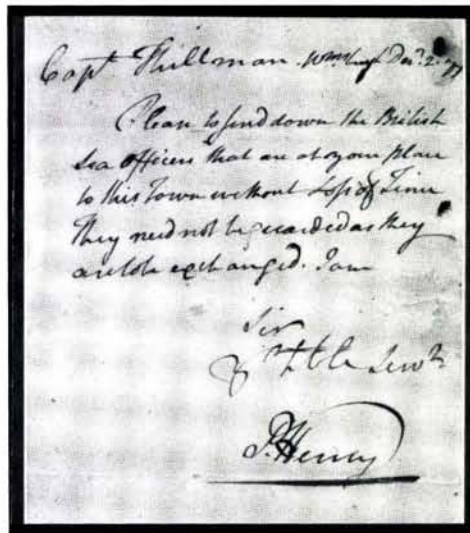

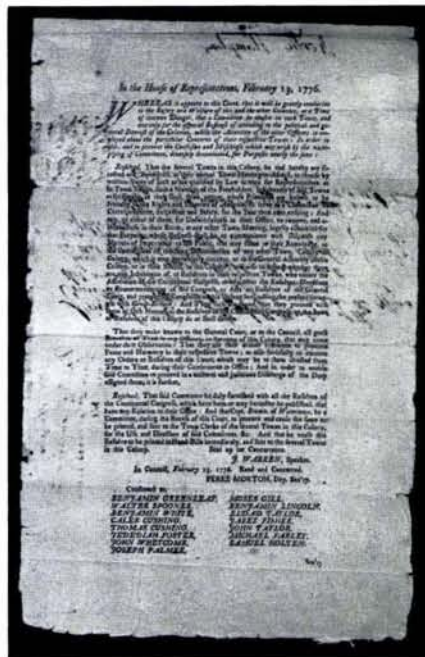
- 201° **George Clinton.** Governor of New York, Revolutionary War general, he was Vice President under Jefferson and Madison. 2p ALS dated Apr. 7, 1779, reference to the hardships of colonists at the hands of "the enemy" (most likely Tories and Indians): "*It is impossible for me to give any directions more particular. . . Distribution of the money granted for the relief of the Frontier inhabitants whose property has been destroyed by the enemy.*", signed as Governor ("Geo Clinton"), each page with left margin reinforced, some creasing E. 500-750
- 202° **Elbridge Gerry.** Signer of both the Declaration of Independence and the Articles of Confederation. ALS, 1 page, dated Jan. 12, 1796, requesting a loan of \$20, Fine E. 200-250
- 203° **Alexander Hamilton.** Signature, with closing sentiment, probably clipped from a letter, mounted on matte board, Fine E. 400-500

- 204° **Patrick Henry.** ALS, 1 page, datelined Williamsburg, Dec. 2, 1777, and addressed to Capt. Hillman. It reads in full: "*Please to send down the British Sea officers that are at your place to this town without loss of time. They need not be guarded as they are to be exchanged. I am Sir Yr hble servt P. Henry*", with integral address leaf in his hand including "by Express", superbly matted and framed (double-sided), Very Fine
- During 1777, in addition to being relected Governor of Virginia, Henry organized and sent out the expedition under Gen. George Rogers Clark which conquered the territory northwest of the Ohio. At this point in his career, Henry may have been motivated in military matters by the slight he suffered in 1776: denied the rank of brigadier general by those in Congress jealous of his successes despite little military experience, he was offered the command of a single regiment while a subordinate was made a brigadier instead. Later that year he was elected the first governor of the state (Photo) E. 3,000-4,000

- 205° **Patrick Henry.** Partly-printed document signed ("P. Henry"), 1 page, dated April 29, 1786, Fine E. 1,500-2,000
- 206° **William Howe.** ALS ("W. Howe") 1 page, dated June 1798, to a General Ross, with integral address leaf, Fine E. 500-750
- 207° **Lafayette.** ALS, 1 page, in French, dated May 21, 1830, Fine E. 1,000-1,250
- 208° **Lafayette.** ALS, 1 page, in French, dated Oct. 23, 1831, Fine E. 1,000-1,250
- 209° **Tench Tilghman.** Secretary and aide-de-camp to Washington. A lieutenant colonel in the Continental Army, he carried the dispatch announcing the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown. ALS dated June 19, 1780, to an unidentified recipient, and which reads in full: "The enclosed were addressed to General Dickinson, supposing he commanded the advanced troops - Mrs. Shoemaker, the lady who writes the letters, is one of those sent in to New York by the State of Penn. and has the proper passports from the Governor and Council - His Excellency therefore desires to give directions to the officer upon the lines to permit her and her Baggage to pass to Elisabeth Town. Mr. Brown the Bearer will carry down the passport.", portion of docketing on back reads: "Genl Washington/Order for a flag", reinforced along folds, Fine E. 500-750
- 210° **Oliver Wolcott.** 136 pay orders issued by the committee that managed all of the military finances of the Connecticut colony, each signed by Wolcott and the state treasurer John Lawrence, dated 1778-1780. Fine-Very Fine lot E. 2,500-3,000
- 211° **David Wooster.** Brigadier General in the Continental Army. Partly-printed document signed, 1 page, dated May 18, 1774, tipped to album leaf, Fine E. 1,000-1,250

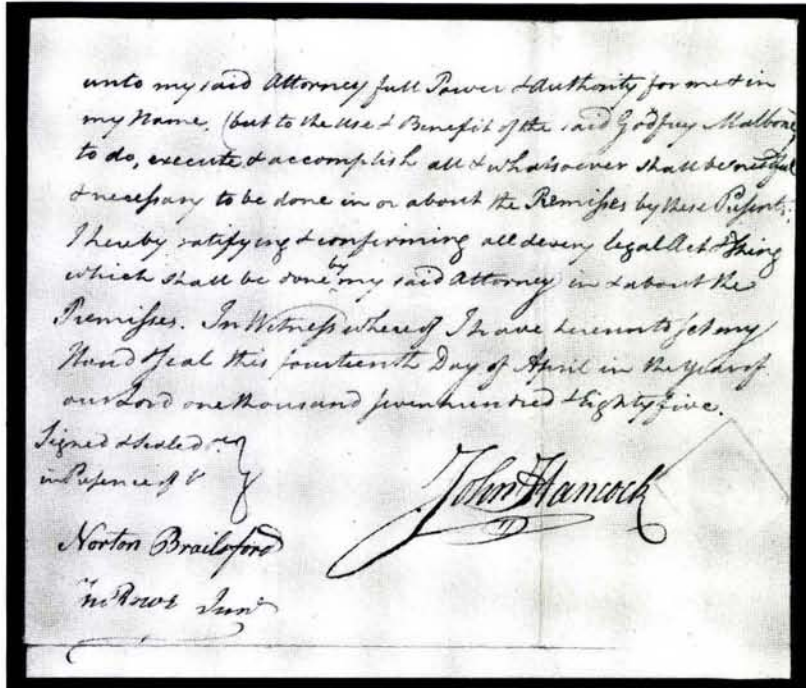

- 212° **Revolutionary War Broadside.** Headed, "In the House of Representatives, February 13, 1776" it reads (in part): "Whereas it appears to this court, that it will be greatly conducive to the Safety and Welfare of this and the other Colonies, at a Time of Common Danger, that a Committee be chosen in each Town, and one only for the especial Business of attending to the political and general Interest of the Colonies," etc., and signed "J. Warren, Speaker." Important docketing on back (from North Hampton, Mass.) reads: "April 17th 1776. At a full meeting of the Committee - Voted that the Prisoners Viz the Officers that are sent to the care of this Committee shall be at their lodging every night at sun set. . . Voted that should the Officers disobey the preceeding order of Committee that they be Committed to confinement." Small paper loss at edges and separation at top, far from text, Fine and rare Revolutionary War broadside (Photo) E. 3,000-4,000

213° **Whiskey Rebellion.** ALS dated Dec. 2, 1794, to New Jersey Assembly Committee members from Jonathan Dayton, Elias Boudinot, Lambert Cadwalader and John Beatty: "We have received thro' Mr. Imlay a copy of the order of the House of Assembly directing you to prepare instructions to our Senators to use their endeavours that the extra pay of three Dollars per month allowed to the Militia of the State now in the service of the United States against the Pennsylvanian insurgents be reimbursed to the State of New Jersey." etc., light aging and very minor paper loss E. 500-750

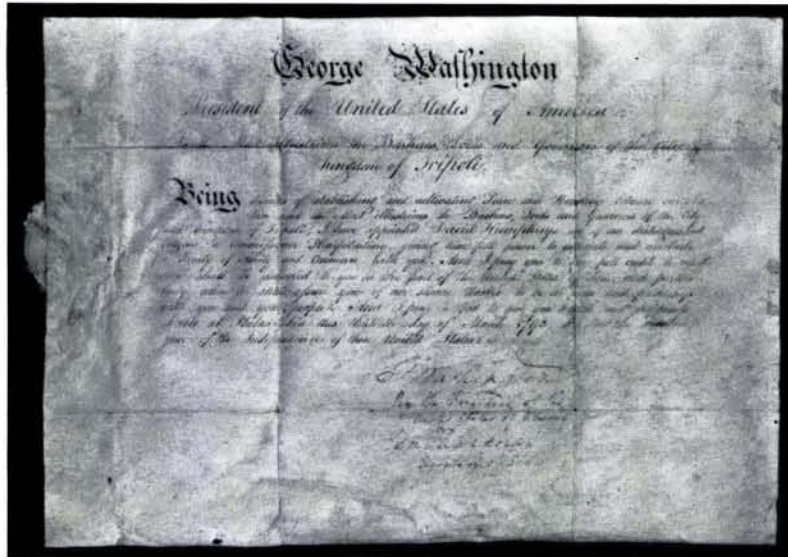

- 214° **George Clymer.** Signer. ALS ("GC"), 2 pages undated, with original outer folded cover (Philadelphia cds), fresh and Fine E. 250-350
- 215° **John Hancock.** DS as Governor of Massachusetts, dated 1785, granting power of attorney for representation in a land transaction, separations in central fold, Fine (Photo) E. 3,000-4,000
- 216 **Richard Stockton.** Signer. Signature on small piece: "Not Guilty Sir! R Stockton", Fine and rare E. 200-250
- 217 **George Walton.** Signer. Bold signature on Richmond County, Georgia petition, undated though it mentions a 1782 promissory note, reduced, otherwise Fine E. 200-250
- 218 **William Williams.** Signer, 1 page ALS dated Oct. 3, 1780 at Lebanon Conn., reduced irregularly at bottom, just affecting paraph E. 250-300
- 219 **Lot of Thirteen Signers.** Includes DS of Stephen Hopkins, Samuel Huntington, Philip Livingston, Robert Morris, William Williams, Oliver Wolcott, also autograph note and clipped signature of Josiah Bartlett, ALS of Elridge Gerry, bank check of George Clymer, clipped signatures of Abraham Clark, Thomas McKean, John Morton and Roger Sherman, lot also contains two cases of mistaken identity: a Samuel Adams and a James Smith, Fine lot E. 750-1,000

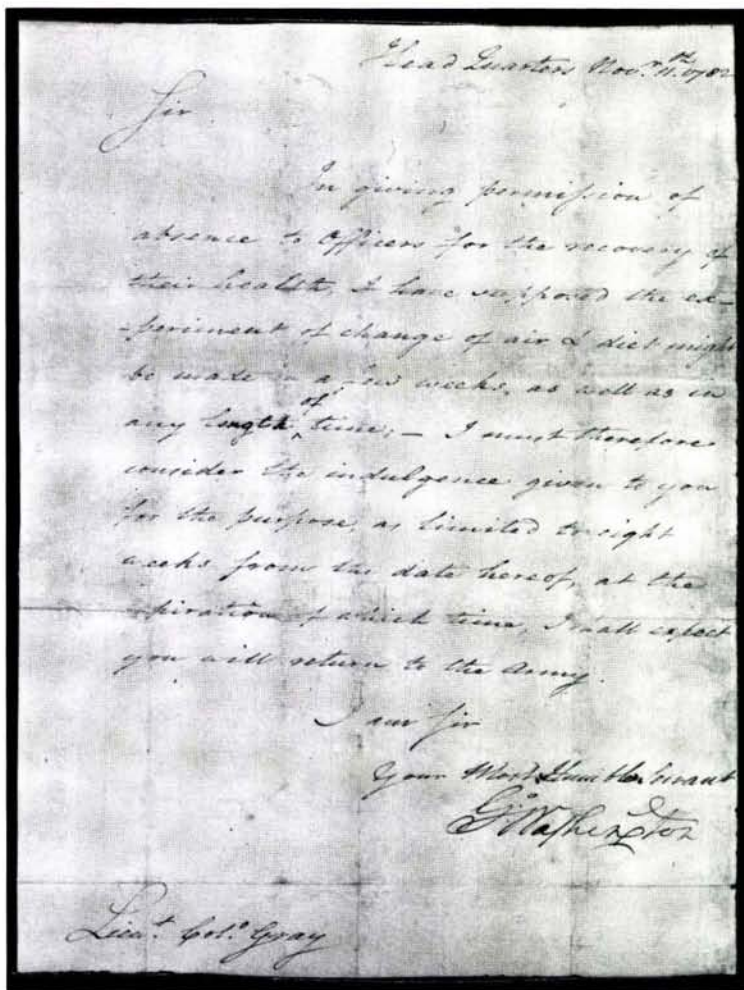
220° **George Washington.** Signature as President on 1795 document

PRESIDENT WASHINGTON APPOINTS DAVID HUMPHREYS COMMISSIONER PLENIPOTENTIARY TO NEGOTIATE A TREATY WITH THE GOVERNMENT OF TRIPOLI

"To the Most Illustrious the Bashaw Lords and Governors of the City & Kingdom of Tripoli" appointing David Humphreys Commissioner. It reads (in full): *"Being desirous of establishing and cultivating Peace and Harmony between our Nation and the Most illustrious the Bashaw, Lords and Governors of the City and Kingdom of Tripoli, I have appointed David Humphreys one of our distinguished Citizens, a commissioner Plenipotentiary, giving him full power to negociate and conclude a Treaty of Amity and Commerce with you. And I pray you to give full credit to whatever shall be delivered to you on the part of the United States by him, and particularly when he shall assure you of our sincere desire to be in peace and friendship with you and your people. And I pray God to give you health and happiness. Done at Philadelphia this thirtieth day of March 1795 and in the nineteenth year of the Independence of these United States: G. Washington."* Also signed by Secretary of State Edmund Randolph, with presidential seal at left, strong folds clear of signature, parchment lightly cleaned with some of text showing light fading. Fine.

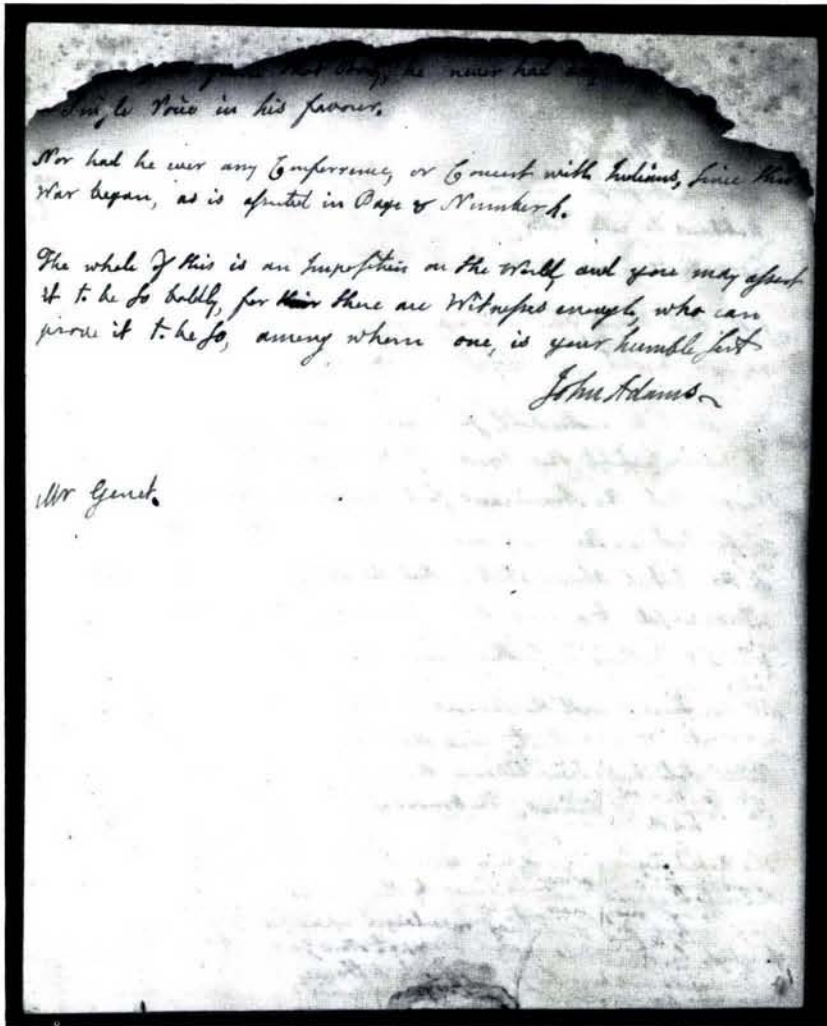
A Connecticut poet, Humphreys entered the Continental Army with the rank of captain and was appointed aide-de-camp to General Washington in 1780 until the end of the war. Upon the disbanding of troops, Humphreys accompanied Washington to Mt. Vernon and remained a member of his family for nearly a year. In 1784 he was appointed secretary of legation to Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, who were sent to negotiate various treaties in Europe. Just prior to the Tripoli appointment, he was appointed the first U.S. minister to Portugal. During the War of 1812 he commanded two Connecticut regiments, with the rank of brigadier-general.

A document historically important in its foreshadowing of the Tripoli Wars, there is also the association of Washington's warm friendship with Humphreys and the trust he placed in him - clearly not misplaced when the extent of Humphrey's accomplishments, only touched on here, is considered(Photo) E. 7,500-10,000

221° **George Washington.** LS, 1 page, datelined Head Quarters, Nov. 11, 1782, to Lt. Col. Ebenezer Gray: "Sir In giving permission of absence to Officers for the recovery of their health, I have supposed the experiment of change of air & diet might be made in a few weeks, as well as in any length of time; -I must therefore consider the indulgence given to you for the purpose, as limited to eight weeks from the date hereof, at the expiration of which time, I shall expect you will return to the Army. I am Sir Your Most Humble Servant G. Washington" The draft is in the hand of David Humphreys, Fine, housed in a custom archival slipcase(Photo) E. 15,000-20,000



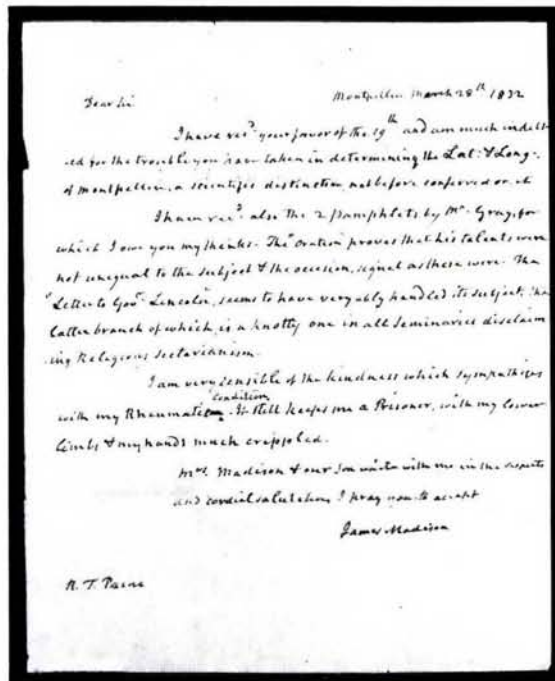

222° **John Adams.** Last two pages of a multi-page letter to a "Mr. Genet", concerning the recruitment of Indians by Robert Rogers during the American Revolution (Rogers was a frontiersman known for his raids with Rogers' Rangers). Adams denial, states (in part): "It ought to be contradicted for many Reasons, but especially because if uncontradicted Ship Papers will be considered by Historians as Proof, that the Americans, first engaged the Savages to take an active Part in the War, and will give a Colour to the Argument of the British Administration, that the Indians must be engaged on their side to prevent them from engaging on the other, whereas nothing is further from the Truth. All the Treaties with the Savages made by Congress. . .were that they should be neutral. So far from soliciting their alliance, the Congress, more than once refused the Services of Indians. The Honour of employing Indians is wholly British. This Robert Rogers, instead of being addressed by the principal inhabitants of Philadelphia, was made Prisoner by the Council of Safety, the first day of his Landing in that City, and embarked upon his Parole, in Violation of which he afterwards made his Escape to New York, and had there a Commission given him by General Howe. . .from that boy he never had any . . .Single voice in his favor. . .The whole of this is an imposition on the World, and you may assert it to be so boldly, for there are Witnesses enough, who can prove it to be so, among whom one, is your humble Servt John Adams." - 223 **Thomas Jefferson and James Madison.** Signatures as President and Secretary of State respectively, on 1807 land grant, small paper loss at folds, toning affects signatures E. 1,000-1,500



- 224° **Thomas Jefferson.** Free frank on folded cover to David Gelston, a delegate to the Provincial Congress; in 1801 President Jefferson appointed him Collector of the Port of New York, Fine(Photo) E. 3,500-4,000
- 225° **Thomas Jefferson.** Free frank on undated folded cover to Nathaniel Bowditch, a mathematician and astronomer, Fine(Photo) E. 3,000-3,500



- 226° **James Madison.** ALS, 1 page, dated Mar. 28, 1832, shortly after his 81st birthday: "I am very sensible of the kindness which sympathizes with my Rheumatic condition. It still keeps me a Prisoner, with my lower limbs & my hands much crippled." etc., Fine letter from this founding father(Photo) E. 6,000-8,000

- 227° **James Madison and James Monroe.** DS, dated Mar. 21, 1812, Baltimore, 1p, ship's papers authorizing "Thomas A. Lane, master or commander of the Brig Tigress. . .lying at present in the port of Baltimore bound for Bordeaux and laden with Tobacco, Hides, Cotton and Whale Bone to depart and proceed with his said Brig on his said voyage," etc., signatures of Madison as President and Monroe as Secretary of State, in four languages, with two wax seals, also signed by James McCulloch, Collector of the Port of Baltimore, Fine E. 2,500-3,000
- 228° **James Madison.** DS, 1 page, dated July 24, 1813, naval commission countersigned by William Jones, Secretary of the Navy, with eagle engraving at top, intact seal, Fine E. 500-600



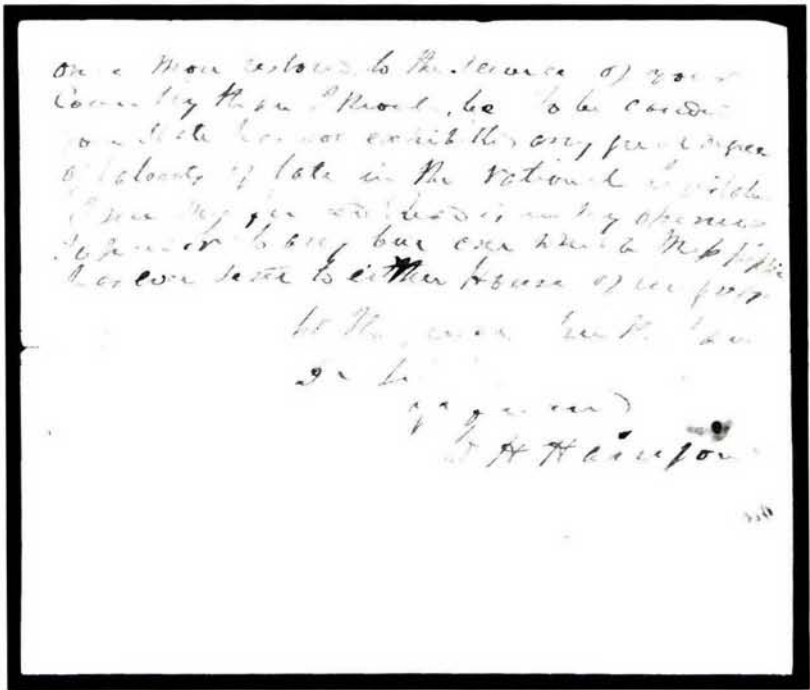

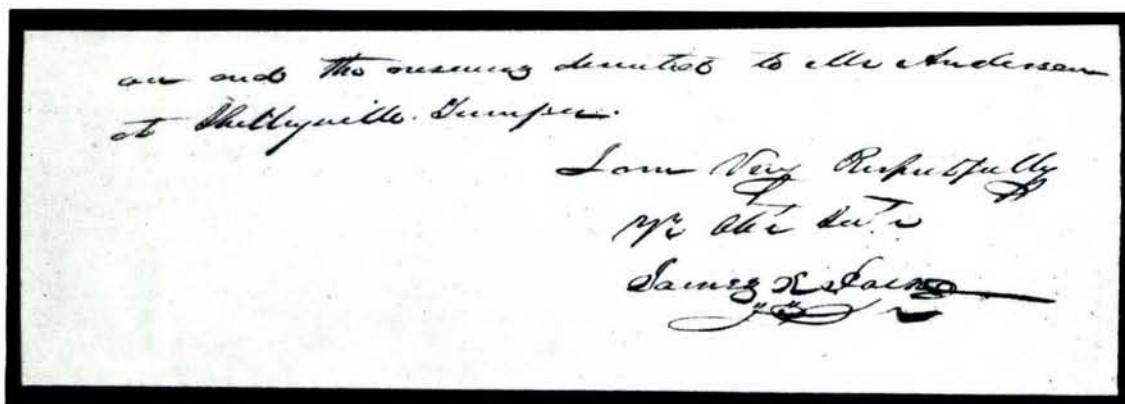
- 229° **Dolley Madison.** Autograph free frank ("Free D P Madison") on undated folded cover to James Maury, "Late Consul to Liverpool from the U.S." in New York, with red "Orange CH Va." cds and matching "Free" hs, discreetly silked at sides, Very Fine (Photo) E. 1,000-1,250
- 230° **James Monroe.** ALS, 1 page, dated Jan. 12, 1797, Paris. Fine E. 1,500-2,000
- 231° **James Monroe.** ALS dated July 21, 1815, 1 page, written while serving as Madison's Secretary of War. Fine E. 1,500-2,000
- 232° **James Monroe.** ALS, 1 page, dated July 29, 1816, tape in left margin, Fine E. 1,500-2,000
- 233° **James Monroe.** LS ("Jas. Monroe") as Secretary of State, dated Jan. 3, 1817, to James McCulloch, Collector of Customs, Baltimore, tiny paper loss clear of signature, Fine E. 1,000-1,500
- 234° **James Monroe.** Signature on 1823 land grant in the Indiana Territory, manuscript portions faded but signature is clear E. 300-400
- 235° **James Monroe.** Signature on Jul. 22, 1817 land grant, some light soiling, file fold through "J", Fine E. 300-400
- 236° **James Monroe.** Signature on 1824 land grant, small edge toning and two corner nicks, Fine E. 300-400
- 237° **James Monroe.** Signature as President, clipped from a land grant, Fine ... E. 200-250
- 238° **John Quincy Adams.** LS as Secretary of State, 1 page, dated Jan. 8, 1823, Fine E. 1,000-1,250
- 239° **John Quincy Adams.** Frank ("J. Q. Adams") on cover addressed in his wife's hand, ms. postmark of Quincy Mass. and matching "Free", opened at sides with small tears, still Fine E. 250-350
- 240° **Louisa Catherine Adams.** Free frank ("L C Adams") on mourning cover to Washington, red Boston postmark and matching "Free", address in her hand, minor soiling, corner crease at T.R., clear of frank, Fine and very scarce (Photo) E. 1,000-1,500

- 241° **Andrew Jackson.** ANS ("A. J."), docketing as President, on back of 1830 folded letter from **James Gadsden** postmarked Tallahassee Fla. and addressed to "Andrew Jackson President USA", though the letter begins, "My dear General", lettersheet torn in half and restored (showing only on face, far from signature and affecting only third line of address) E. 400-500
- 242° **(Andrew Jackson).** 3pp description from M. T. Simpson following a visit to Jackson at his farm in Tennessee on the eve of his election: "*He walks in the field, attends to his people, often late & early under a hot sun. He seems to infer a preference to private life. . .but will serve the people. . .if by them chosen to office. The many slanders don't seem to affect him so much as I expected. . .The Committee at Nashville have entirely exculpated Mrs. Jackson [a reference to the ongoing libels, some leading to duels, regarding Jackson's innocently premature marriage to his wife before her divorce had been finalized] . . . The lady is mild, unassuming, and appears, and I believe is, 'the devout Christian, abounding in meekness, and submission to the will of heaven' . . .*" etc., Huntsville Ala. postmark, Fine E. 200-250
- 243° **Martin Van Buren.** LS as Secretary of State, 2pp, dated April 15, 1829, to The Chevalier Don Francisco Pacon: "*Sir I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the letter of the 11th instant, which you have done me the favor to write to me, together with a list of all the Grants of Land, purporting to have been made in the Floridas, by the Government of His Catholic Magesty which you had lately procured from the Island of Cuba.*" etc. Slightly faded, otherwise Fine E. 1,000-1,250
- 244° **Martin Van Buren.** ALS, 2pp, dated March 13, 1841, Fine E. 400-500
- 245 **Martin Van Buren.** Signature as President on 1840 land grant in Rock County, Wisconsin Territory, Fine E. 200-250



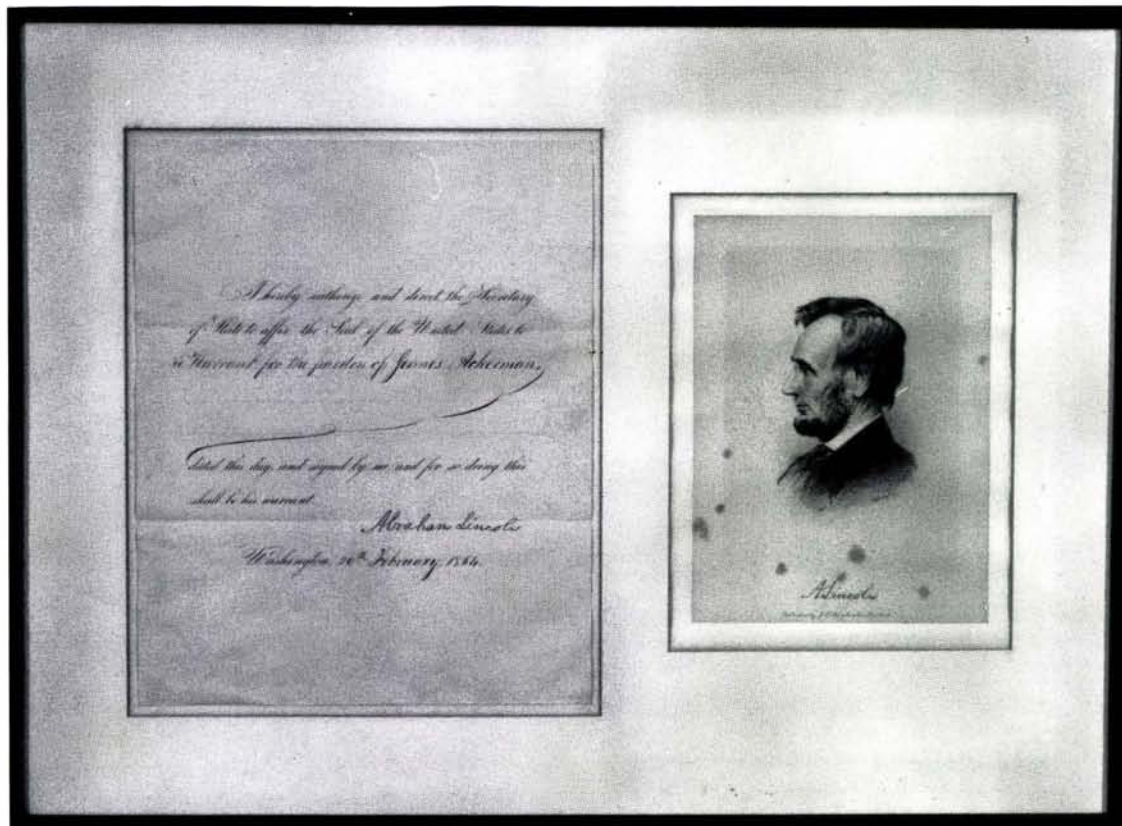

- 246° **William Henry Harrison.** ALS ("W H Harrison"), 1 page, dated November 10, 1826 at Cincinnati, to G. Poindexter, tiny edges tears and light aging, small ink smear about "son", Fine(Photo) E. 2,500-3,500



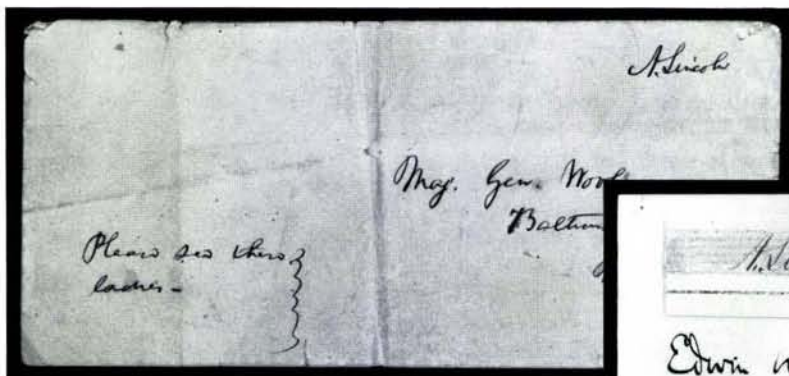

Lee's loyalty to the South was unwavering, but defending the issue of slavery had no part in his devotion to the Confederate cause. The careful, polite wording in the letter reflects Lee's background and education, but the underlying sensitivity, especially in the avoidance of any word or phrase that would suggest that this was merely a business letter concerning chattel, is characteristic of the man, not the Virginia aristocracy of the 1850s. During the war Lee favored arming the slaves and in February 1865 he wrote to the congressional sponsor of a Negro soldier bill: "The negroes, under proper circumstances, will make efficient soldiers. . .Those who are employed should be freed. It would be neither just nor wise. . .to require them to serve as slaves."(Photo) E. 20,000-25,000
