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

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Information for Bidders

Bidding

The following means are available for placing bids:

- 1) Attending the Live Auction in Person: All bidders must register for a paddle, and new bidders must provide references at least three business days in advance of the sale.
- **2) Live Internet Bidding:** Instructions for participating as a Live Internet Bidder are provided on the page opposite.
- **3) Phone Bidding:** Bidders can be connected to the sale by phone and bid through a member of staff. Requests for phone bidding are subject to approval (please contact our office at least 24 hours before the sale). A signed Bid Form is required.
- 4) Absentee Bids. All bids received in advance of the sale, either by mail, fax, phone, e-mail or internet, are Absentee Bids, which instruct the auctioneer to bid up to a specific amount on one or more lots in the sale. Absentee Bids sent by phone, fax or e-mail should arrive at least one hour prior to the start of the sale session. Bids entered through Live Internet Bidding will be visible to the auctioneer during the sale. Written bids should be entered legibly on the Bid Form in the sale catalogue. E-mail and internet bids should be carefully typed and double-checked. All new bidders must provide references. We recommend calling or e-mailing to confirm that Absentee Bids sent by mail, fax or e-mail have been received and entered.

Pre-Sale Viewing

Subject to availability, certain lots (except group lots) can be sent to known clients for examination. Requests must be made no later than 7 days prior to the sale. Lots must be returned on the day received. Postage/insurance costs will be invoiced.

In addition to regular viewing, clients may view lots by appointment. Our staff will be pleased to answer questions or provide additional information about lots.

Expert Certification

Individual items offered without a PF or PSE certificate dated within the past five years may be purchased subject to independent certification of genuineness and our description. Please refer to the Conditions of Sale and Grading Terms for policies governing certification.

Shipping and Delivery

Procedures and charges for shipping lots are printed on the back of the Bid Form. Bidders are responsible for all prescribed shipping charges and any applicable sales tax or customs duties.

Price Realized



Conditions of Sale (please read carefully before bidding)

THE PROPERTY DESCRIBED IN THIS CATALOGUE WILL BE OFFERED AT PUBLIC AUCTION BY ROBERT A. SIEGEL AUCTION GALLERIES, INC. ("GALLERIES") ON BEHALF OF VARIOUS CONSIGNORS AND ITSELF OR AFFILIATED COMPANIES. BY BIDDING ON ANY LOT, WHETHER DIRECTLY OR BY OR THROUGH AN AGENT, IN PERSON, OR BY TELEPHONE, FACSIMILE OR ANY OTHER MEANS, THE BIDDER ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES TO ALL OF THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS OF SALE.

- 1. The highest bidder acknowledged by the auctioneer shall be the buyer. The term "final bid" means the last bid acknowledged by the auctioneer, which is normally the highest bid offered. The purchase price payable by the buyer will be the sum of the final bid and a commission of 15% of the final bid ("buyer's premium"), together with any sales tax, use tax or customs duties due on the sale.
- 2. The auctioneer has the right to reject any bid, to advance the bidding at his discretion and, in the event of a dispute, to determine the successful bidder, to continue the bidding or to reoffer and resell the lot in dispute. The Galleries' record of the final sale shall be conclusive.
- 3. All bids are per numbered lot in the catalogue unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to group two or more lots, to withdraw any lot or lots from the sale, or to act on behalf of the seller. The Galleries will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for the failure to execute such bids or for any errors in the execution of such bids.
- 4. Lots with numbers followed by the symbol ° are offered subject to a confidential minimum bid ("reserve"), below which the lot will not be sold. The absence of the symbol ° means that the lot is offered without a reserve. If there is no reserve, the auctioneer has sole discretion to establish a minimum opening bid and may refuse an offer of less than half of the published estimate. Any lot that does not reach its reserve or opening bid requested by the auctioneer will be announced as "passed" and excluded from the prices realized lists after the sale. The Galleries may have a direct or indirect ownership interest in any or all lots in the sale resulting from an advance of monies or goods-in-trade or a guarantee of minimum net proceeds made by the Galleries to the seller.
- 5. Subject to the exclusions listed in 5(A), the Galleries will accept the return of lots which have been misidentified or which have obvious faults that were present when the lot was in the Galleries' custody, but not so noted in the lot description. All disputed lots must be received by the Galleries intact with the original packing material within 5 days of delivery to the buyer but no later than 30 days from the sale date. (5A) EXCLUSIONS: The following lots may not be returned for any reason, or may not be returned for the reasons stated: i) lots containing 10 or more items; ii) lots from buyers who registered for the pre-sale exhibition or received lots by postal viewing, thereby having had the opportunity to inspect them before the sale; iii) any lot described with "faults," "defects" or a specific fault may not be returned because of any secondary fault; iv) photographed lots may not be returned because of centering, margins, short/nibbed perforations or other factors shown in the illustrations; v) the color of the item does not match the color reproduction in the sale catalogue or website listing; vi) the description contains inaccurate information about the quantity known or reported; or vii) a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description.
- 6. Successful bidders, unless they have established credit with the Galleries prior to the sale, must make payment in full before the lots will be delivered. Buyers not known to the Galleries must make payment in full within 3 days from the date of sale. The Galleries retains the right to demand a cash deposit from anyone prior to bidder registration and/or to demand payment at the time the lot is knocked down to the highest bidder, for any reason whatsoever. In the event that any buyer refuses or fails to make payment in cash for any lot at the time it is knocked down to him, the auctioneer reserves the right to reoffer the lot immediately for sale to the highest bidder. Credit cards (Visa, Mastercard and Discover only) can be accepted as payment but will be subject to a 3% Convenience Fee, which will be added to the total of the entire invoice (including hammer price, buyer's premium, shipping and transit insurance charges and any applicable taxes).

- 7. If the purchase price has not been paid within the time limit specified above, nor lots taken up within 7 days from the date of sale, the lots will be resold by whatever means deemed appropriate by the Galleries, and any loss incurred from resale will be charged to the defaulting buyer. Any account more than 30 days in arrears will be subject to a late payment charge of 1½% per month as long as the account remains in arrears. Any expenses incurred in securing payment from delinquent accounts will be charged to the defaulter. A fee of \$250.00 per check will be charged for each check returned for insufficient funds.
- 8. All lots are sold as genuine. Any lot accompanied by a certificate issued by The Philatelic Foundation or by Professional Stamp Experts within 5 years of the sale date is sold "as is" and in accordance with the description on the certificate. Such lots may not be returned for any reason, including but not limited to a contrary certificate of opinion. Buyers who wish to obtain a certificate for any item that does not have a P.F. or P.S.E. certificate (dated as above) may do so, provided that the following conditions are met: (1) the purchase price must be paid in full, (2) the item must be submitted to an acceptable expertizing committee with a properly executed application form within 21 days of the sale, (3) a copy of the application form must be given to the Galleries, (4) in the event that an adverse opinion is received, the Galleries retain the right to resubmit the item on the buyer's behalf for reconsideration, without time limit or other restrictions, (5) unless written notification to the contrary is received, items submitted for certification will be considered cleared 90 days from the date of sale, and (6) in the event any item is determined to be "not as described", the buyer will be refunded the purchase price and the certification fee up to \$800.00 unless otherwise agreed to in writing.
- 9. Until paid for in full, all lots remain the property of the Galleries on behalf of the seller.
- 10. Agents executing bids on behalf of clients will be held responsible for all purchases made on behalf of clients unless otherwise arranged prior to the sale.
- 11. The buyer assumes all risk for delivery of purchased lots and agrees to pay for prescribed shipping costs. Buyers who receive lots in the U.S. are obligated to pay whatever sales tax or compensating use tax might be due, and buyers outside the U.S. are responsible for all customs duties.
- 12. The bidder consents that any action or proceeding against it may be commenced and maintained in any court within the State of New York or in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York, that the courts of the State of New York and United States District Court for the Southern District of New York shall have jurisdiction with respect to the subject matter hereof and the person of the bidder. The bidder agrees not to assert any defense to any action or proceeding initiated by Galleries based upon improper venue or inconvenient forum. The bidder agrees that any action brought by the bidder shall be commenced and maintained only in a Federal Court in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York or the State Court in the county in which Galleries has its principal place of business in New York. The bidder agrees not to use a public conflict resolution service and not to use any form of social media to publish comments or information about the Galleries and its employees which might harm the Galleries' reputation or business. These Conditions of Sale shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the substantive laws of the State of New York, and shall constitute an agreement that shall be binding on the parties, and their respective heirs, administrators, distributees, successors and assignees.

Grades, Abbreviations and Values Used in Descriptions

Grades and Centering

Our descriptions contain detailed information and observations about each item's condition. We have also assigned grades to stamps and covers, which reflect our subjective assessment. For stamps, the margin width, centering and gum are described and graded according to generally-accepted standards (an approximate correlation to numeric grades is provided at right). Although we believe our grades are accurate, they are not always exactly aligned with third-party grading terms or standards for all issues. A lot may not be returned because a certification service grades a stamp lower than the grade stated in the description. Information from the P.S.E. Stamp Market Quarterly and P.S.E. Population Report^{5M} is the most current available, but lots may not be returned due to errors or changes in statistics or data.

Extremely Fine Gem (90-100): The term "Gem" describes condition that is the finest possible for the issue. This term is equivalent to "Superb" used by grading services.

Extremely Fine (80-90): Exceptionally large/wide margins or near perfect centering.

Very Fine (70-85): Normal-size margins for the issue and well-centered with the design a bit closer to one side. "Very Fine and choice" applies to stamps that have desirable traits such as rich color, sharp impression, freshness or clarity of cancel.

Fine (60-70): Smaller than usual margins or noticeably off center. Pre-1890 issues may have the design touched in places.

Very Good (below 60): Attractive appearance, but margins or perforations cut into the design.

For example, stamps issued in tropical climates are expected to have some gum disturbance due to humidity, and such condition is not considered a negative factor in pricing.

Covers

Minor nicks, short edge tears, flap tears and slight reduction at one side are normal conditions for 19th century envelopes. Folded letters should be expected to have at least one file fold. Light cleaning of covers and small mends along the edges are accepted forms of conservation. Unusual covers may have a common stamp with a slight crease or tiny tear. These flaws exist in virtually all 19th century covers and are not always described. They are not grounds for return.

Catalogue Values and Estimates

Unless otherwise noted, the currently available *Scott Catalogue* values are quoted in dollars with a decimal point. Other catalogues are often used for foreign countries or specialized areas and are referred to by their common name: *Stanley Gibbons* (SG), *Dietz, American Air Mail Catalogue* (AAMC), *Michel, Zumstein, Facit*, etc. Estimates are indicated with an "E." and reflect our conservative valuation in dollars. Reserves will never exceed the low end of the estimate range; they will sometimes exceed Scott Catalogue value for stamps in Extremely Fine condition.

Because of certain pricing inconsistencies in the *Scott Catalogue*—for example, blocks that have no gum, the absence of premiums for Mint N.H. items, etc.—we cannot guarantee the accuracy of values quoted for multiples, specialized items and collection lots. We generally try to be conservative, but buyers may not return a lot because of a discrepancy in catalogue value due to Scott pricing inconsistencies.

THE GENESIS FOR THE ROBERT R. HALL STAMP COLLECTION BEGAN before Robert existed. His father, Bruce, collected stamps as a hobby in the earlier part of the 20th century. This interest in stamps was passed on to Martha (Robert's older sister) and to Robert. Robert quietly continued adding to the collection and sharing his experiences with his sister.

As Robert was nearing retirement, his focus and passion for stamps and their history intensified. Robert shared this interest with his children: Bruce, Rob, and John. Bruce had the most interest in philately, and he spent many years by Robert's side assisting him in improving the collection.

Robert was born in Los Angeles in 1926 and served the country in World War II as a telecommunications expert. After the war, he attended and graduated from Kenyon College in Ohio. Although he majored in mathematics, he became the only horticulturist to ever graduate from his alma mater.

After working to acquire the requisite knowledge of the flower industry, he started his own business in Encinitas, California, growing chrysanthemums, carnations, and poinsettias for the Christmas season, among other plants. In 1959, Robert married Elisse Vogel and spent 37 years together before her passing.

Bruce, Rob, and John are proud to present the stamp collection that is their father's legacy as a dedicated and knowledgeable philatelist. Its significance as a personal achievement will be permanently documented in this catalogue, and the treasures within will become part of other collectors' legacies.

FRESH AND FINE. A RARE SOUND ORIGINAL-GUM EXAMPLE OF THE 10-CENT 1847 ISSUE.

The Act of March 3, 1847, signed by President Polk, specified that Postmaster General Cave Johnson "be authorized to prepare postage stamps, which when attached to any letter or packet, shall be evidence of the payment of the postage..." The law's effective date was July 1, and the Post Office acted immediately to secure a contract with Rawdon, Wright, Hatch and (the new partner) Edson, so that stamps could be distributed by that date. The Washington vignette is based on the iconic image painted by Gilbert Stuart.

FINE-VERY FINE. A RARE AND SPECTACULAR SET OF BLOCKS OF SIX OF THE 1847 ISSUE REPRODUCTIONS.

The 1847 Reproduction were printed from new plates in sheets of 50 subjects. Multiples (especially blocks) are rare.

VERY FINE APPEARANCE. POSITION 7R1E — THE SEVENTH STAMP IN THE RIGHT PANE OF PLATE ONE EARLY — IS THE ONLY ONE OF THE 1,000 POSITIONS USED TO PRINT IMPERFORATE ONE-CENT STAMPS THAT SHOWS THE COMPLETE DESIGN (TYPE I). A GREAT RARITY.

The published census compiled by Jerome S. Wagshal contains at least 98 unduplicated records of Scott 5. There are probably no more than ten examples existing outside of the Wagshal census population. Therefore, the 1c 1851 Type I is the rarest of all United States stamps issued regularly prior to the 1868 Grills.

A RARE ORIGINAL-GUM EXAMPLE OF THE 1851 ONE-CENT TYPE ID IMPERFORATE. THIS IS WITHOUT QUESTION ONE OF THE RAREST OF ALL UNITED STATES CLASSICS TO OBTAIN IN UNUSED CONDITION.

A thorough search of past auctions and our own extensive records produced a result that surprised us. The unique block of eight from Plate 1E contains Position 7R1E (Scott 5) and five Type Ib stamps (with faults). The famous ex-Waterhouse copy of Position 7R1E is joined with a pair of Type Ib stamps (this unused unit is currently owned by William H. Gross). The multiples, containing a total of seven Type Ib stamps, really do not fit the needs of collectors who want a single unused example of Scott 5A. We located only four other unused singles, and we were surprised at the conspicuous absence of any unused Scott 5A stamps in major name sales, including Wagshal. The last we offered was in our 2008 Hoffman sale.

VERY FINE AND CHOICE. A BEAUTIFUL SOUND EXAMPLE OF THE IMPERFORATE 1851 ONE-CENT TYPE Ia, WHICH CLEARLY SHOWS THE CHARACTERISTICS OF THE TYPE.

Stamps printed from Plate 4 were issued in April, May and briefly in June 1857 before perforations were introduced. The relatively small number of imperforate Plate 4 stamps issued during this period explains the rarity and desirability of any of the imperforate stamp types produced from this plate (Ia, Ic, II, III and IIIa). The extremely rare Type Ia, showing the full design at bottom, was furnished only by 18 of the 200 subjects on Plate 4 (the remaining two bottom-row positions were sub-type Ic).

Stamps printed from Plate 4 were issued in April-June 1857 before perforations were introduced. The relatively small number of imperforate Plate 4 stamps issued during this period explains the rarity and desirability of any of the imperforate stamp types produced from this plate.

The Type IIIa from Plate 4 with original gum is extremely rare. We have offered perhaps five examples in the past 20 years in comparable condition.

FINE-VERY FINE APPEARANCE. A RARE ORIGINAL-GUM BLOCK OF FOUR OF THE 1851 3-CENT TYPE II ORANGE BROWN, SCOTT 10A, FROM PLATE O. AN IMPORTANT CLASSIC UNITED STATES IMPERFORATE MULTIPLE.

This block comes from the lower left corner of the block of twelve from Plate O that was once part of the Stanley M. Piller and Robert Zoellner collections. After our Zoellner sale it was cut into smaller units, primarily to harvest a Mint N.H. single, but this block was preserved.

The 5c stamp was issued in 1856, five years after the 1c, 3c and 12c values and one year after the 10c were issued. It was typically used to pay the 5c shore-to-ship rate for mail sent overseas and also in multiples for the 10c transcontinental or 15c U.S.-French treaty rates.

With the exception of some rare types of the 1c and 10c, such as Scott Nos. 5 and 16, the 5c stamp is the most difficult denomination to obtain with four margins in sound originalgum condition. The spacing between stamps was very narrow, leaving little margin for error when separating the stamps, which explains why so few examples are known with four margins. When other factors such as gum, color and impression are taken into consideration, the rarity and beauty of the stamp offered here may be fully appreciated.

Type I stamps come from the bottom 20 positions of the plate. They are the only stamps to show the design complete at bottom. For some reason the sheet margin at bottom was often trimmed away, leaving a dearth of quality copies. The Type IV stamps come from only eight positions, but we would rank the two types equally in terms of the rarity of sound four-margin original-gum copies.

We have offered only one other comparable example in terms of margins and condition, in the Whitman sale.



The Neinken book states "A block of 4 or larger, all the stamps Type II, which come from the top and second row of the plate [twelve], is a most desirable item in any collection."

This block of four was part of a block of six sold in the March 15-16, 1989 Christie's sale of the Walter C. Klein collection, where it was described as unused without gum. The Philatelic Foundation issued certificate 207106 (May 1, 1989) to Andrew Levitt as "Unused No Gum." Subsequently, the block was broken, and this block of four was sold to Mr. Hall by another dealer (not Mr. Levitt) with a photocopy of the PFC 207160 with the words "Unused OG" deceptively substituted in the copy. This is a cautionary tale and good reason to use The Philatelic Foundation's searchable database to verify photocopies of certificates.

This stamp was printed from Plate 4, which originally produced imperforate stamps and was used only briefly after the introduction of perforations in 1857 before being discontinued. Original-gum examples of stamps from Plate 4 are extremely scarce.

This stamp was the top left position in the vertical block of six from the Grunin and Klein collections, which comprised two Type III and four Type IIIa stamps. After the 1988 Klein sale held by Christie's, the block was divided into two singles and a block of four (offered as lot 47 in this sale).

This block was printed from Plate 4, which originally produced imperforate stamps and was used only briefly after the introduction of perforations in 1857 before being discontinued. Original-gum examples of stamps from Plate 4 are extremely scarce.

This was part of the vertical block of six in the Grunin and Klein collections. After the 1988 Klein sale it was divided into this block and two singles (Positions 63R, offered in lot 46 of this sale, and 64R).

This stamp is extremely difficult to obtain with superior margins and centering, due to the narrow spacing on the plate, which was laid out prior to the introduction of perforations in 1857. Finding such an example in unused condition with original gum adds considerably to the difficulty. Even superb copies will show perforations impinging on at least one frameline.

VERY FINE APPEARANCE. A RARE CENTERED ORIGINAL-GUM EXAMPLE OF THE $1858\ 5$ -CENT BRICK RED SHADE.

Many collectors know this issue by type and shade, but fewer are aware of the order of production (or release). This state of confusion is partly due to the Scott Catalogue. The distinctive Brick Red shade of the 5c 1857 Issue comes first in the series of Scott-listed perforated 5c issues, but its true release date comes later in the sequence.

Based on dated covers, the 5c Type I shades were released in the following order: 1) Red Brown, Scott 28, EDU 8/23/1857; 2) Indian Red, Scott 28A, EDU 3/31/1858; 3) Brick Red, Scott 27, EDU 10/6/1858; 4) Brown, Scott 29, EDU 3/21/1859, almost certainly the last printing from the first 5c plate. The second 5c plate was made from a new six-relief transfer roll with the design projections cut away at top and bottom, to varying degrees. The Type II Brown was issued first (Scott 30A, EDU 5/4/1860), and the Orange Brown printing from the same plate followed about one year later (Scott 30, EDU 5/8/1861).

After surveying dozens of classic United States sale catalogues, we found approximately twenty stamps with original gum, allowing for duplicate offerings and excluding the one known original-gum block. Of the stamps we counted, about half had perfs touching on two sides or were deeply cut into on one side. Almost two-thirds had stains or small faults

VERY FINE. AN EXTREMELY RARE AND DESIRABLE SOUND UNUSED EXAMPLE OF THE 1858 5-CENT INDIAN RED.

Our search of old auction catalogues and the records of The Philatelic Foundation and P.S.E. yielded only eleven unused examples of Scott 28A. Of these, only five have been described as having any gum whatsoever. These are:

- 1) The stamp offered in the Whitman sale (Siegel Sale 968, lot 37, realized \$130,000 hammer), previously in the 1941 C. A. Brown sale by Harmer, Rooke & Co. where described as "full original gum", also ex 1968 Rarities sale and A. T. Seymour Collection (Siegel Sale 373, Apr. 23, 1970, lot 35) where described as "large part original gum" and 2005 Rarities sale (lot 102, realized \$75,000 hammer)
- 2) The "Ambassador" copy (Siegel Sale 300, Apr. 27, 1966, lot 45A), described as part original gum, also ex "Argentum" (Siegel Sale 807, Feb. 23, 1999, lot 76) where described as "unused (traces of gum)", the stamp offered here
- 3) The Caspary/Lilly copy, described in both catalogues as full original gum and with light horizontal crease, offered in our auction of the Hoffman Collection (Siegel Sale 956, lot 35, realized \$180,000 hammer)
- 4) Part original gum, light diagonal crease and two small corner creases, ex Geisler and "Laila" (Siegel Sale 972, lot 3039, realized \$110,000 hammer)
- 5) Large part original gum, small corner creases, a recent discovery (Siegel Sale 976, lot 1224, realized \$95,000 hammer).

Ex "Ambassador" and "Argentum". With 1992 P.F. certificate ("genuine with traces of gum"). Scott Retail \$40,000.00 as no gum. Scott Retail as original gum 175,000.00



5c Brick Red (27). Remarkably well-centered with perfs clear of design all around, cancelled by blue town circular datestamp, bright shade, Very Fine and choice, the 5c Brick Red is rarely found with colored town datestamps, with 1997 and 2000 P.F. certificates 1,825.00

5c Indian Red (28A). Deep shade in the unmistakable true Indian Red color, towards the deeper red end of the color spectrum, choice centering with perfs clear of outer projections on all sides, neat strike of circular datestamp

EXTREMELY FINE. A BEAUTIFUL USED EXAMPLE OF THE 1858 5-CENT INDIAN RED WITH STUNNING COLOR.

The deepest shade of Red Brown from the 1858 printing is known as Indian Red. It is found in a short spectrum of color, ranging from a dark purplish shade to a vivid "glowing" orange shade. To be classified as Indian Red, the stamp's impression must be strong throughout, especially in the area of the oval surrounding Jefferson's head. If a stamp possesses anything less than a very deep impression with the characteristic intense red shade, it will fall short of Indian Red, Scott 28A (and that is why Scott 28b was created as "second place").



There are only three blocks of four of the 5c Brown, Type I, which was printed in 1859. Amazingly, all were owned by Walter C. Klein, and two of the blocks contain the defective transfer variety, Position 23R1. Details of the three recorded blocks are as follows:

- 1) Positions unknown, sound, each stamp well-centered, ex Worthington, Sinkler, Ward, Klein and Whitman (Siegel Sale 968, lot 39, realized \$125,000 hammer)
- 2) Positions 12-13/22-23R1, block of four with bottom right stamp showing the transfer flaw, slight reinforcement, tiny nick in perf hole at top left, ex Caspary, Klein and Zoellner
- 3) Positions 13-14/23-24R1, the block offered here, ex Caspary, Lehman and Klein.

Unlike the 1861 Orange Brown, the earlier printing in Brown was not left in Southern post offices when the issue was demonetized in August 1861. Prior to the discovery of the block of 20 in the Frelinghuysen collection, the largest recorded multiple was a block of nine. A horizontal block of six is also known (creased thru bottom three stamps) as are approximately a half-dozen blocks of four. This is certainly one of the finest of the existing blocks of any size.

Type I characteristics are only found on the 20 stamps that comprise the bottom row of the plate. Due to narrow spacing on the plate and difficulties in aligning the perforating machine, stamps at the bottom of the plate usually have perforations cutting into the bottom portion of the design. This is a negative, because Type I is defined as having the design complete at bottom. The population of stamps available to collectors showing the type characteristics is extremely limited, especially when other factors such as gum and soundness are taken into consideration. The example offered here, in sound condition and showing the design characteristics, is extremely desirable.

The first perforated 10c stamps produced by Toppan Carpenter from sheets printed from Plate 1 are notorious among collectors for their poor centering. They are also very scarce in original-gum condition because, unlike 10c Plate 2 stamps (Scott 35), there were no supplies on hand in 1861 when the issue was demonetized due to the outbreak of the Civil War.

EXTREMELY FINE. ONE OF THE RAREST OF ALL 19TH CENTURY UNITED STATES STAMPS THAT EXIST IN MINT NEVER-HINGED CONDITION AND THE FINEST OF THE FEW ORIGINAL-GUM 1857 10-CENT TYPE IV STAMPS EXTANT.

The 1857 10c Type IV stamps come from eight positions scattered throughout Plate 1 that have the top, bottom or both lines recut. Only 4% of all 10c Plate 1 stamps produced were Type IV's, and an even smaller percentage was issued with perforations. Except for a few blocks containing Type IV positions, original-gum examples are exceedingly rare. We know of one other Extremely Fine original-gum single, ex "Ambassador" (Siegel Sale 300), but it is hinged. To the best of our knowledge, this Mint Never-Hinged example is unique in terms of condition and grade.

The 90c stamp was issued in 1860, along with the 24c and 30c values, all of which were needed to prepay high international letter rates established by various postal treaties. The basic 24c and 30c rates to England, France and Germany created a large volume of mail franked with those values. However, the 90c saw much more limited use, partly due to the rates in effect, but more because of the American Civil War. When supplies of current postage stamps were declared invalid in the South and ultimately demonetized by the Federal government, the 90c had been in use for only one year. For this reason, genuinely cancelled copies are scarce and covers bearing the 90c are extremely rare. Approximately 180 used examples have been certified as genuine by The Philatelic Foundation, of which approximately one-quarter are sound.

This fact is acknowledged in both the Scott Catalogue and *Stamp Market Quarterly*, and the 30c 1861-68 Issue is one of the few for which which centering standards are adjusted accordingly.

This block is one of approximately eight different blocks we have located in past auctions. It was originally joined with the equally superb block of four in our sale of Alan B. Whitman collection (Siegel Sale 968). This block was originally positioned to the right of the ex-Whitman block. It is possible that these and a few other 30c 1861 blocks were part of a larger multiple, but this and the Whitman blocks have superior centering to any others.



A thorough search through past auction catalogues will demonstrate how rare this stamp is in either used or unused condition. With regard to used stamps, this shade was lacking from the Ishikawa, Grunin, Klein, Caspary and Twigg-Smith collections. The Zoellner collection contained an original-gum single even though the rest of the series was obtained in used condition, because a suitable used stamp was never offered. The superb used single in our Sale 878 (lot 324, realized \$22,000 hammer) was stolen from a Fedex courier and has not been recovered.

Our census of Scott 78c, available at our website at http://www.siegelauctions.com/dynamic/census/78c/78c.pdf, records a total of 36 used examples of this issue, of which only 31 have been certified as genuine by The Philatelic Foundation. We also record nine on cover plus three unused, for a total of 48 potential examples. Of the used off cover copies only ten are confirmed as sound, and of these ten only four have decent centering (one of which is the stolen copy). This leaves only three used copies which are confirmed as sound and centered — Census Nos. 01 (ex Dr. Morris), 02 (ex Natalee Grace) and 30 (ex Floyd, the example offered here).

The D Grill was refitted with the E Grill on or about February 9, 1868. Based on the earliest documented uses of the 3c D Grill (2/1/68) and 3c E Grill (2/12/68), it is our theory that the conversion from the D to E Grill took place very soon after sheets of 3c stamps were first run through the D-equipped machine.

To determine Scott 85's rarity, we surveyed a series of major United States collections. The results of our survey are as follows: Caspary—none; T. Charlton Henry—none; Concord (1994 Rarities)—unused (no gum); "Connoisseur" (Superior 1992)—choice o.g. stamp (also Whitman); Cole—unused (no gum); Grunin—unused (no gum); Ishikawa—unused (no gum); Klein-none; Lilly—off-center block (no gum); Seymour—none; Sinkler—Fine block (no gum); Weisman—unused (no gum); West-none; Zoellner—used only; and Rarities sales (blocks without gum and stamps accounted for elsewhere in this list). A total of eight sound original-gum stamps in Very Fine (5) or Extremely Fine (3) grades have been certified by The Philatelic Foundation. Therefore, although the Scott Catalogue values an original-gum example at \$6,000.00, in real terms the rarity of a sound well-centered 3c D Grill with original gum puts it on a par with the major A and Z Grill rarities (2-8 recorded for each). The bidders will determine the ultimate price, but we foresee this stamp easily realizing a substantial five-figure sum.

A search through 60 years of past auction catalogues and name sales produced only two blocks of four, both poorly centered, which means that there have been no multiples from which choice singles could be harvested. In fact, even among the collections famed for quality Bank Note issues - Caspary, Lilly, Henry, Ambassador, Braus, Floyd, Whitman et al — we could not find any original-gum examples that would grade Very Fine or better. Further demonstrating just how rare Scott 143 is in this condition, the P.S.E. Population Report lists only two stamps in the "OG" category, one graded 90 and the other graded 70, both offered in our recent Curtis sale. The finest original-gum example we were able to locate was offered in our Scarsdale sale (Sale 924, lot 9).

According to the Neil-Rosenthal book (pp. 115-118), one pane of 50 was discovered by Robert Watts, a stamp clerk at one of the sales windows at the Philadelphia General Post Office, who found it between the wrapping paper of a bundle of stamps. He sold it for double face value (\$8.00) to Herman Lewis, a locksmith in Philadelphia. Lewis soon sold it to William S. F. Pierce, who broke it into three pieces: a vertical strip of ten with sheet margin and full arrow at right, a vertical block of 20 containing both plate blocks, and a vertical block of 20 with natural straight edge at left.

The strip of ten was reportedly sold for \$15.00 and was taken to Europe when the owner moved there. It returned to the U.S. in the 1930's, when it was broken. Ethel McCoy owned the vertical strip of four with arrow, and the pair offered here was part of that strip. The vertical block of 20 with straight edge at left was sold to Arthur E. Tuttle, a Philadelphia stamp dealer, who retailed them for \$10.00 per pair. The block of 20 with both plate numbers was retained by Pierce, who later sold the top and bottom plate blocks to Albert Batchelder of the New England Stamp Co. for \$175.00.

The \$1.00 stamp issued for the Trans-Mississippi Exposition was based on an image of cattle in a storm in an engraving by C. O. Murray, a copy of which was loaned to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing by Mrs. C. B. Johnson. The engraving was used as a trademark by an American cattle company, but the image originated in an oil painting by J. A. MacWhirter entitled "The Vanguard", which depicts cattle in the West Highlands of Scotland. The Post Office Department was embarrassed when the painting was identified as the property of the Lord Blyworth, who was sent a formal apology and philatelic memento through the British Ambassador. The memento, a proof item, was donated to the Royal Philatelic Society by Lord Blysworth and hangs today on the walls of the Royal.


The design of the \$2.00 Trans-Mississippi depicts the Eads bridge, which spans the Mississippi River at St. Louis. The original engraving was used on the admission ticket to the Republican Convention of 1896, which nominated McKinley as candidate for president. The stamp, issued during the McKinley Administration, illustrates the natural boundary between East and West and so was appropriate for the Trans-Mississippi Issue. All of the \$2.00 Trans-Mississippi stamps were printed in a single day's run on June 3, 1898.

There are perhaps three imprint and plate number blocks of six in existence. The imprint and plate number block of four format is also extremely rare. 100,000.00

The 1c Pan-American Inverts were found in at least four different post offices around the country, soon after release of the issue in May 1901. Of the 600 to 700 known, many have disturbed gum or are off-center. The stamp offered here is remarkably fresh and certainly one of the best-centered examples known. It was the bottom right stamp in a superb block of four that was offered in the Sotheby Parke Bernet sale on April 29, 1980 (lot 545). The PFC 91985 issued to Andrew Levitt Inc. on October 24, 1980, indicates that the block was broken soon after the auction.

The 1c Pan-American Inverts were found in at least four different post offices around the country, soon after release of the issue in May 1901. According to the revised Johl-King book (p.7) "The first known copies of this error were discovered at Bessemer, Alabama, by the Carrell Jewelry Company on some circulars just prior to mailing them. When they realized the find they had made they lost no time in removing the stamps from the circulars and thus saved them to philately."

The 1c Pan-American Invert in used condition is considerably scarcer than unused. Our updated census, available at our website at http://siegelauctions.com/dynamic/census/294a/294a.pdf, records 48 used examples plus three on cover, for a total of 51 copies. 39 off-cover stamps plus one on cover have faults ranging from corner creases to repairs.

A survey of the Levi records produced 64 single unused stamps (excluding the block of four and rejoined block of four). Many of these were described in auction catalogues more than 40 years ago; therefore, the determination of soundness is uncertain. However, assuming the old descriptions were reaffirmed today, approximately 45% of singles across all centering categories have faults.

FINE CENTERING. A VERY ATTRACTIVE ORIGINAL-GUM EXAMPLE OF THE 4-CENT PANAMERICAN INVERT.

The 4c stamp portrays an electric automobile, known at the time as the "Electric Vehicle Service," as depicted on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad brochure from which the engraving was made. In the background one can see the dome of the Capitol. One of the two men seated at the front was Samuel B. Hege, B&O's passenger agent, so this stamp actually depicts a living person in violation of the law.

The 4c Pan-American Invert was a special printing and not regularly issued. Examples were distributed through two official channels, and the gum on the majority of stamps without "Specimen" overprint was disturbed. In fact, because the stamps were removed from mounting paper, they are generally thinned or have seriously disturbed gum. Based on the centering of this stamp, absence of "Specimen" overprint, and the shifted vignette, we believe this stamp comes from "Sheet 1 Left" as diagrammed in our catalogue for the "Beverly Hills" collection (Siegel Sale 1052, pages 52-53).

This block shows the wheels of the automobile in the vignette touching the surrounding brown frame. Based on the centering of this block, absence of "Specimen" overprint, and the shifted vignette, we believe this block comes from "Sheet 1 Left" as diagrammed in our catalogue for the "Beverly Hills" collection (Siegel Sale 1052, pages 52-53).

A review of our Levi records located seven blocks of four. One has not been seen since the 1944 Col. Edward H. R. Green auction and has probably been broken into singles, and another has not been seen since 1970. One of the well-centered blocks (with thin spots) realized \$325,000 hammer in our sale of the Alan B. Whitman collection (Sale 968B).

HISTORY OF THE 4-CENT PAN-AMERICAN INVERT

The 4c Pan-American Invert Special Printing

Few stamps in United States philately have been as misunderstood from birth as the 4c Pan-American Invert. The footnote in the Scott Catalogue for 296a reads: "No. 296a was a Special Printing and not regularly issued." The stamps come with and without the small rubber-stamped "Specimen" overprint. Most examples are in rough condition and have badly disturbed gum. Everything about the 4c Invert—from the design, which was based on a newly-launched commercial hansom cab service, to the highly irregular way in which the errors reached the public—is steeped in intrigue. The stories conjure up images of portly Victorian era gentlemen in vested suits and high collars, smoking cigars in dark oak interiors, sipping brandy and exchanging an envelope with the "special" inverted automobile stamp from the new Pan-American series.

When the first examples reached the public in 1901 and 1902, they sparked controversy and cries of foul play among certain philatelic spokespersons. The Third Assistant Postmaster General, Edwin C.

Madden, was gleefully handing out 4c Inverts as gifts to colleagues, business associates, dignitaries and even to his own two sons, at a time when charges of manipulation, underhanded procurement schemes, kickbacks and favoritism were aimed at the Post Office Department. The whole episode proved to be an embarrassment to postal officials, and the Assistant Attorney General for POD matters was ordered to investigate. In the end, Madden was cleared of any wrongdoing, but the events surrounding the 4c Invert left a lasting legacy and make for fascinating philatelic storytelling.

Theodore Roosevelt took the oath of office on September 14, 1901, immediately after President McKinley succumbed to the wounds inflicted on him by an assassin's bullets at the Pan-American Exposition in Buffalo. President Roosevelt served out McKinley's second term (1901-1904) and successfully ran for election in 1904.

McKinley's postmaster general, Charles E. Smith, resigned in January 1902, shortly after Roosevelt took office, and was replaced by Henry C. Payne. Therefore, Postmaster General Smith was present for the design, production and release of the Pan-American Issue, but Payne took over this cabinet-level position just as public condemnation of the POD was heating up.

Third Asst. PMG Edwin C. Madden

One constant during the changes in presidents and postmasters general was Third Assistant Postmaster General Edwin C. Madden, who was responsible for POD financial affairs, including the Division of Postage Stamps.

From a management perspective, it was Third Assistant PMG Madden who supervised the activities of this economically important enterprise with revenues of \$95 million in 1899. Madden also made decisions about matters related to stamp issues and production. When the Pan-American Inverts were made, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing was the manufacturer, but Madden was in charge.

Madden and his department were also responsible for a peculiar chapter of U.S. postal history, in which philately provided a vehicle for gestures of "gratitude." The Roosevelt albums—beautiful, leatherbound compilations of small die proofs of past issues—were given to influential individuals. After a comprehensive review of POD practices and policies, such gifts were banned in January 1905.

Production of 4c Inverts

Reports of Pan-American Inverts were widely circulated within two weeks of the May 1, 1901, issue date. Sometime prior to October 1, 1901, Madden ordered his superintendent of the Stamp Division, William C. Fitch, to contact the BEP and ask that any sheets of invert errors detected during the examination process be sent to the Third Assistant PMG's office. This is what both Madden and Fitch claimed during the subsequent investigation. In response the BEP furnished four sheets of 100 of the 4c denomination and nothing else. What Madden and Fitch did not know, according to their account, is that the BEP had no invert sheets on hand to give them, and instead made a special printing of 4c Inverts. Madden was cleared of any wrongdoing, because there was no evidence that he had made a formal request for error stamps to be printed by the BEP, who took the initiative on their own.

Two plates were used to make all 4c stamps, including the inverts: plate 1142 for the black vignette, and plate 1145 for the brown frame. Each plate was configured with 200 subjects arranged in 20 horizontal rows of 10 across. Engraved in the margins were the BEP imprint and plate number at top and bottom, guide markings to facilitate perforating and cutting, denomination markers in the corners (right-reading, so the pressman could see them clearly), siderographers' initials in the corners, and across the top a sequence of pressmen's initials, which were punched into the plate each time it was put on the press.

Each of the 4c plates was put on the press in multi-day runs in 1901. The vignette plate 1142 was on the press three times: Mar. 22 to May 1, May 6 to 9, and Aug. 31 to Sep. 7. The frame plate 1145 was on the press four times, from Apr. 2 to May 4, May 14 to 18, Sep. 11 to 21, and the last time for only two days, from September 30 to October 1.

The last press run for the 4c—the frame printing on September 30 and October 1—is the latest for any denomination above the 2c. It is undoubtedly the date on which the frame plate 1145 was used to make invert error sheets. Presumably there was a small supply of vignette sheets on hand from the August 31-September 7 printing, because that plate was not put on the press after September 7.

To visualize the sheets as BEP employees would have in 1901, it is important to disregard the philatelic "center inverted" concept. The vignette was printed first, so it is the frame that was inverted relative to the center. The sheets were cut in half when the perforations were applied, using a rotary knife (cutting wheel) in place of a perforating pin wheel at the center as they passed through the perforator. The BEP supplied the top halves—from their perspective—of four full printed sheets of 200, rather than tops and bottoms from two sheets.

The pressmen's initials on the brown frame plate 1145 are not present on any of the Inverts, but on the normal stamps they read: NLD AY ND WS. The numerous pressmen's initials on the black vignette plate 1142 are present on some of the Inverts. They read: BM NLD BM PHS BM PH

The BEP employment records provided by Hallie Brooker (BEP historian) match NLD and ND with Norman L. Dayton and four female assistants with the same NLD or ND initials. Several printers and assistants had the initials WS, including William A. Sacket. The BM initials which repeat many times could belong to B. V. Martling, a plate printer. The repeating PHS initials do not fit with anyone, but there was an H. Scriven (plate printer), Paul R. Stewart (skilled helper), and Miss Pauline M. Scott (printer's assistant). The DM initials toward the end of the string on the vignette plate do not match any male employee, but they do match Daisy L. Marity and Daisy Murphy, both printer's assistants. There is no match for HI, which appears third from the end on the vignette plate (possibly repeated at the end).

Distribution of the 4c Inverts in 1901-1904

The stamps Madden received were given out as souvenirs or gifts to a variety of dignitaries and acquaintances. His office was the only source of stamps with the "Specimen" handstamp, and Madden claimed all but "one or more" had been marked. A record was kept, listing the recipient of each stamp, their location and the date of receipt. This remarkable document is fully transcribed in James H. Bruns' 1990 Congress Book article and helps correct previous misinformation about the number distributed.

The earliest entry is dated October 7, 1901, for a stamp given to Otto Carmichael, a Washington correspondent, newspaper publisher and Roosevelt supporter, who had written a long article on the Pan-American Inverts in the May 26, 1901, *Boston Herald*. The last entry is dated September 24, 1904.

A total of 12 copies were given out during the last three months of 1901. In 1902 a total of 150 stamps were distributed, with a large concentration around April 10. From January to April 1903, only 6 were given away. On November 7, 1903, Madden responded to an official inquiry and stated that up to that date, a total of 186 stamps had been distributed, and the remaining 214 were on hand. However, the records show that as of November 7, 1903, a total of 168 stamps had been distributed. Either Madden transposed two digits (168 and 186) and simply deducted 186 from 400 to arrive at 214 on hand without physically counting them, or he had given away more than shown in the official record.

None were given out from April 1903 until February 15, 1904, the day Madden took one for himself. On June 11, 1904, a copy was given to C. A. Hamilton, and finally on September 24, three more were given to H. M. Bacon, F. E. Smith and A. M. Travers (their second copies). The total number of stamps distributed was 173, and there were 163 different recipients listed (154 received one copy each, 8 received two copies each and one received three copies). If the record is correct and Madden's November 1903 count was wrong, then the balance on hand after September 24, 1904, was 227 stamps.

The appearance of 4c Inverts in the hands of government cronies in 1902 caused an uproar among philatelists who were extremely sensitive to "made for stamp collectors" schemes, not unlike some of the

controversy created by the more recent Non-Inverted Jenny sheets. At the start of the 20th century, certain countries' postal administrations had been thoroughly discredited after deliberately manufacturing stamp errors, and the thought that U.S. postal officials might stoop to such a low infuriated collectors and dealers, especially those who did not receive any of the valuable invert stamps.

In particular, Charles H. Mekeel used his weekly stamp newspaper to rail against Madden and the POD for ordering 4c Invert errors and handing them out as favors. But Mekeel had another hidden axe to grind with the current postal administration. discounted postage rate for newspapers had been revoked by Madden's office, because Mekeel did not have a paid subscriber base, but instead sent the papers out as promotions to customers. Madden made sure to point out this long-running feud Mekeel when he defended himself against Mekeel's accusations.

Madden probably never intended to "order" error stamps, and when they showed up, he may well have believed they were found among the stock of stamps for distribution. Once he had the 4c Inverts, he felt it was a well-established practice to give out philatelic souvenirs, and he did. However, the times were changing, and the serious crimes committed by other postal officials cast a different and unforgiving light on Madden's actions. Beginning in October 1903, the 4c Invert incident was investigated by Postmaster General Payne, then by the Assistant Attorney General for the POD, Charles H. Robb. Madden was exonerated, but certain practices were banned as a result of this investigation.

Distribution of the 4c Inverts in 1914

Of the 4c Inverts on hand after September 24—227 according to the record, 209 by Madden's count—one sheet of 100 was transferred to the National Museum stamp collection. The sheet was affixed to a page in an album with the label "Series of 1901 for Pan-American Exposition. Pane of 100 with center inverted," and the album was inventoried in July 1913.

The fate of the remaining stamps (127 at most) is uncertain, but philatelic writers have stated that they were destroyed. However, the number given in these accounts is 194, which cannot be correct. The maximum number of stamps that could have been in postal officials' hands is 127 (400 printed -173 distributed -100 in sheet to National Museum =127).

The National Museum collection was curated by Joseph B. Leavy, who was hired in 1913 as the government's first philatelist. Leavy wanted the museum to have a complete U.S. collection, and he set about creating a "want list" of missing items. Instead of using cash resources to acquire the stamps, Leavy relied on the National Museum's policy allowing for the exchange of duplicate or unnecessary items for needed objects. In 1914 Leavy arranged for two exchanges involving the 4c Invert sheet, which was divided after removal from the album page.

The museum accession records contain an entry for "Exchange No. 3" with Nassau Stamp Company of New York City, dated October 21, 1914. The museum received a number of 19th century U.S. stamps, including a used 15c 1869 Pictorial Invert, and Nassau received 77 copies of the 4c Invert and 300 Philippines Adminstration overprinted stamps.

The record for "Exchange No. 4" with H. F. Colman, a Washington D.C. dealer, is also dated October 21. It lists another group of 19th century U.S. stamps, including a used 30c 1869 Pictorial Invert, received in exchange for 20 copies of the 4c Invert, plus nine copies of the 24c 1869 (Re-Issue?) and 32 sets of 1c to 90c 1890 Imperforates (16 pairs?).



Joseph B. Leavy Custodian, National Museum

While the earlier distribution of 173 4c Inverts from the Third Assistant

Postmaster General's office had scattered the stamps far and wide, the 1914 National Museum exchange placed 97 copies into two major dealers' hands. The stamps from the National Museum album probably included a fair number with missing or disturbed gum, but evidently some of the stamps in the sheet escaped being stuck to the album page. This explains the existence of 4c Inverts with badly disturbed gum and others with clean unmarred gum.

The Levi records of the 4c Invert contain about 120 stamps without the "Specimen" overprint, including seven blocks of four and one imprint strip of four. In addition, there are 67 stamps with the "Specimen" overprint (including some with the overprint removed). No multiples have the "Specimen."

How many stamps were given away by Madden without the "Specimen" overprint? It is impossible to determine the exact number. However, if the 97 stamps exchanged by the National Museum (all without overprint) are deducted from the 120 in the Levi records, there are at least 23 unoverprinted stamps which must have come from Madden's office. Clearly his claim to investigators that only "one or more" were distributed without being marked "Specimen" was, at best, the product of a faulty memory.

It is now more than 100 years since the last of the 4c Inverts was released to the public, and it has taken that much time to fully understand how this invert error came to be, and how it fell into collectors' hands. In common with the 1933 Saint-Gaudens \$20 Double Eagle, the 4c Pan-American Invert's allure lies not only in its great rarity, but, perhaps even more so, in the behind-the-scenes intrigue which surrounded its creation.

Our census of unused Scott 314A, available at http://www.siegelauctions.com/enc/census/314A.pdf, records four pairs, two guide line pairs and nine singles, for a total of 21 unused stamps. One of the singles is in the Miller Collection at The New York Public Library. Our census also contains 44 used examples, including three strips of three (one on cover), three singles on separate covers, and 32 single used copies.

With the rising popularity of vending and affixing machines, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing received numerous requests from manufactures for supplies of imperforate stamps, which could then be privately perforated to conform to each firm's machine. In May 1908, a supply of 25 sheets (400 stamps per sheet) of the 4c 1902 Issue, without perforations, was delivered to the Schermack Mailing Machine Co. in Detroit. The entire supply was cut into coils with Schermack Type III perforations, designed for the firm's patented affixing machine and delivered to the Winfield Printing Co. for use on mass mailings of advertising material. Approximately 6,000 were used on a mailing for Hamilton Carhartt Manufacturer, and almost all of the 4,000 balance were used on a mailing for Burroughs Adding Machine Co.

All of the Scott 314A stamps that exist in unused condition originate from a local Detroit stamp collector, Karl Koslowski, who was the only one to purchase some of the 4c Imperforates, either from the Winfield Printing Company or from the Schermack firm. His earliest account of the event appeared two years later in the *Philadelphia Stamp News*, and is considered to be the most reliable of several conflicting stories told by Koslowski (and interpreted by others) at later dates. In the 1910 article, Koslowski explains that he purchased 50 stamps and expected to be able to buy more, but the supply was destroyed when he returned. We can account for 32 of the 50 stamps Koslowski claims he acquired. There are 21 unused stamps currently in our census, all of which must have come from him, and he used at least 11 stamps on mail to friends, including the strip of three on a Koslowski cover, two used strips of three off cover (the mass mailings were all singles) and two singles on separate Koslowski covers. The earliest known cover is dated at Detroit on May 27, 1908, from Koslowski to a friend in Austria, and the latest is dated April 8, 1909, which was mailed to him using a sheetmargin single from Sicklerville, New Jersey. Apart from the stamps Koslowski used, there is one recorded commercial cover (June 2, 1908) and approximately 32 used single stamps, most of which were probably removed from the mass-mailing covers.

The two recorded Mint N.H. examples of Scott 314A come from the ex-Lilly strip of five, which was cut into two pairs and one single by Jack E. Molesworth after it appeared in the 1985 Rarities sale. We shall refer to the stamps in that strip as #'s 1-5. Stamp #1 was cut as a single and is described in the 1985 Rarities sale as having slight margin thinning (it is hinged, although we erroneously reported it as Mint N.H. in our earlier census report). The pair comprising #2-3 was sold as part of the Zoellner collection in 1998, and soon after was divided into the Mint N.H. single (#2, the stamp offered here) and hinged single (#3, ex Whitman). The pair comprising #4-5 was also ex Whitman. The left stamp in this pair (#4) is Mint N.H., one of two known in that condition. The pair with one stamp Mint N.H. realized \$400,000 hammer in our 2009 Whitman sale.



According to Johl, these first government coils were an experiment, and collectors and dealers were generally unaware of their existence. Regular sheets of 400 were printed and then perforated in only one direction. They were then cut into strips of 20. The strips were then pasted together to form rolls.

It is unknown exactly how many of these experimental coils were produced (one paste-up pair is known). They were superseded less than a year later by the Washington-Franklin issue coils, the first of which were issued on December 29, 1908.

Our census of Scott 316, shown on the following page and available at our website at http://siegelauctions.com/enc/census/316.pdf, records nine pairs, three line pairs (one of which is rejoined) and an unused single, for a total of 25 stamps. None are known used.

According to Johl (Volume 1, page 181), only 10,000 of the 10c Washington coil stamp were issued. Our census of Scott No. 356 in used multiples, available at http://siegelauctions.com/dynamic/census/356/356.pdf, contains twelve pairs, one strip of four and two strips of three. The other strip of three was offered in our Natalee Grace sale. Five of the pairs originated on the same cover, which was prepared by Henry Hammelman and mailed in August 1911. A guide line pair has been certified as genuine, but the cancel needs to be reexamined to see if it is one of the fakes produced during the last 20 years.

This strip was on a piece of mail postmarked on board the Japanese steamship *Chiyo-Maru*, which sailed from San Francisco on July 19, 1910. The "Chiyo-Maru Sea Post 19. 7. 10." (July 19, 1910) was applied by the official Sea Post Office clerk to mail posted on the ship. In this case, the letter was franked with at least three of the 10c 1909 horizontal coils.

This 2c coil was in production for only a short period of time before being superseded by the Perf 8½ issue. Due to the greater popularity of the horizontal coils with users, combined with a wary attitude by many collectors that early coils were simply trimmed stamps, many were used and few preserved.

Approximately ten used pairs are known. The only used guide line multiple we record is the strip of four from our Natalee Grace sale, which is specifically mentioned as being unique in Scott Catalogue (Sale 1028, lot 357). A review using Power Search shows that most other pairs are significantly off-center.

A census of the Orangeburg coil, published in The Philatelic Foundation's *Opinions VII* book, certifies two singles and six unused pairs, plus an uncertified unused pair with paste-up at left in the The New York Public Library's Benjamin K. Miller collection (on extended loan to the Smithsonian National Postal Museum). The P.F. Census comports with our own, which is shown at left. Of the certified pairs, three are centered strongly to one side. This pair comes from the strip of five that was broken into two pairs and a single. The other pair from the strip, which adjoined this pair to the right, contains the only known Mint N.H. example of the Orangeburg coil (the other stamp in that pair has a small thin spot). That pair was last offered in our 2009 sale of the Alan B. Whitman Collection, where it realized \$330,000 hammer (Sale 968B, lot 494).

The 30c Perf 10 Unwatermarked, Scott 476A, has no trace of the single-line watermark. Although one or two stamps from the discovery sheets have been found with "ghost" watermarks, the Scott Catalogue and The Philatelic Foundation continue to recognize Scott 476A.

In an article in *Opinions V*, published by The Philatelic Foundation, William T. Crowe, former head of the Expert Committee, discussed the discovery of this rare stamp and how it might have been issued. The production of Scott 476A occurred during the period of transition from gauge-10 perfs to gauge 11. Bureau records do not list a 30c printing on unwatermarked paper that was perforated 10, but the existence of two certified panes — one bottom-right pane from Plate 6917 and one top-right pane from Plate 6911 — is evidence that the combination of new unwatermarked paper and old 10-gauge perfs occurred, even if inadvertently. Stamps from these two panes (200 total), two left sheetmargin blocks of four and a bottom plate no. 6914 single, none of which have any trace of watermark, are the only accepted examples of Scott 476A.



The 1c Green, Scott 594, is waste from a horizontal rotary printing used to make coils. At the beginning or end of a coil-stamp print run from the 170-subject rotary plates, some leading or trailing paper was produced that was too short for rolling into 500-stamp rolls. In 1919 the Bureau devised a plan to salvage this waste by perforating and cutting the sheets into panes. They were put through the 11-gauge flat-plate perforator in use at the time, giving the sheets full perforations on all sides. The existence of Scott 594 was not reported until four months after the final sheets were delivered, and the 1c Rotary Perf 11 was soon recognized as one of the rarest United States stamps.

Our census of unused examples of Scott 594, based on the Levi and P.F. records and available at our website at http://www.siegelauctions.com/dynamic/census/594/594.pdf, contains only 18 stamps. Of these only 11 have any gum, and three of those have perforated initials of Crowell Publishing Co. of Springfield, Ohio, which some collectors regard as equivalent to a cancel.

FRESH AND FINE. A RARE SOUND EXAMPLE OF THE 2-CENT HARDING ROTARY PERF 11.

Warren G. Harding, the 29th President, died in San Francisco on August 2, 1923, during a cross-country "Voyage of Understanding". Several people suggested a Harding memorial stamp, printed in black, and it was rushed into production. The first flat plate printing (Scott 610) was issued on September 1, 1923, in his home town of Marion, Ohio, followed less than two weeks later by the normal Perf 10 rotary press printing (Scott 612) on September 12.

The 2c Harding Rotary Perf 11 stamp was discovered in 1938 by Leslie Lewis of the New York firm, Stanley Gibbons Inc. Gary Griffith presents his hypothesis in *United States Stamps 1922-26* that rotary-printed sheets of 400 were first reduced to panes of 100 and then fed through the 11-gauge perforating machine normally used for flat plate sheets. This method explains the existence of a straight-edge on Scott 613. Production quality and quantity was very low, due to the rotary press stamps' natural tendency to curl, and the use of the flat plate perforator for the slightly different-sized rotary printing.

Our census of the 2c Harding Rotary Perf 11, available at our website at http://www.siegel-auctions.com/dynamic/census/613/613.pdf, records 45 used singles (one faintly cancelled, if at all), one used pair and the recently-discovered used strip of three. Of the singles, 26 are sound, but of these only six rate a grade of Very Fine or Extremely Fine.



23 of the recorded examples of Scott No. 613 are shown in this photo (drawings of five additional stamps appear at lower right). The first three rows comprise stamps discovered at the firm of Stanley Gibbons Inc. The three at lower left were found by the Weills of New Orleans among unsorted 2c stamps soaked from envelopes.

The Hall stamp offered in this sale is shown in this photo—it is the righthand stamp in the sheet-margin pair in the top row.

It is well-known among stamp specialists and professionals that examples of this stamp come in different grades of freshness and condition. Many of the original 100 stamps were mistreated by collectors during the years, despite the stamps' rarity and value. Colonel Green himself allowed moisture to affect some of the stamps he retained. Other examples have become slightly toned from improper storage and climatic conditions. Hinging has caused thins and creases in numerous stamps, and at least seven have been "lost" to philately — or nearly so as in the case of the copy swept up in a vacuum cleaner. This Position 69 stamp is in an extraordinary state of freshness, with excellent color and brightness.

HISTORY OF THE WORLD'S MOST FAMOUS STAMP ERROR

The First Government Airmail Service

The United States launched the world's first government airmail service in 1918. The use of airplanes in World War I established aviation as a critical element of national defense. Still, using planes to carry the mail struck many as impractical, if not impossible. Representative Martin B. Madden of Chicago told Captain Benjamin B. Lipsner, the key organizer of the first airmail service, "...I know of nothing that is

more ridiculous or asinine than a venture of this sort. If I had my way about it, I would see that you are thrown into the federal penitentiary, and the key thrown away." Undeterred by naysayers, Postmaster General Burleson, Second Assistant Postmaster General Otto Praeger, Captain Lipsner and others worked furiously to make airmail a reality, preparing the men and equipment for the May 15th inauguration date.

The first airmail route ran between three cities: Washington D.C. to the south, New York City to the north, and Philadelphia in between. A relay of modified Curtiss JN4-H "Jenny" biplanes carried the mail bags in both directions, leaving New York and Washington D.C. at the same time. The mail was transported between the airfields and post office by truck. A letter sent from Washington in the morning arrived in New York, about 218 miles away, by the afternoon, and a special delivery messenger delivered it to the recipient.

Or, at least that is how it was supposed to work. On the inaugural flight day, with President Woodrow Wilson, the First Lady and numerous dignitaries gathered at the Potomac Park

airfield, the Curtiss biplane would not start. After realizing it had never been fueled and there was no aviation fuel on the field, the mechanics siphoned enough from a nearby plane. With the "Hisso" engine roaring, Lieutenant George L. Boyle took flight and cleared the tree tops, barely. An observant few noticed he was headed in the wrong direction. After flying south instead of north, the confused pilot attempted to land in a farmer's field near Waldorf, Maryland, but flipped the plane after the wheels sunk into the soft ground. Lt. Boyle and the mail were unharmed, but the northbound flight from Washington never made it on the 15th. The mail and additional "First Trip" mail were carried on the following day.

The southbound flights fared better. Lt. Torrey H. Webb flew from Belmont field at 11:30 a.m. and arrived in Philadelphia (Bustleton) one hour later. Lt. James C. Edgerton filled in for the missing Lt. Boyle and departed Bustleton at 1:14 p.m. The first airmail to the nation's capital arrived at 2:50 p.m.

The Airmail Special Delivery Stamp

To facilitate payment of 24c postage on a letter carried by airmail, the Post Office Department issued a new stamp. The rate included all postage and the 10c fee for special delivery service. To promote the enterprise, the stamp was designed with an image of the biplane. This was the second U.S. stamp to picture a plane—the first was the 1913 20c Parcel Post issue, which depicts an early model biplane with the prophetic caption "Aeroplane Carrying Mail."

The new airmail stamp was designed by Clair Aubrey Huston, one of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing's most talented artists and the designer of the Washington-Franklin and 1922 series, as well as the 20c Parcel Post stamp six years earlier. Huston's design relied on the airplane image to convey the stamp's purpose and left out the word "airmail" or "airpost."

Working with Huston were two other masters of security engraving, Marcus W. Baldwin and Edward M. Weeks. For more than 30 years after the stamp was issued, Weeks received credit for engraving the "Jenny" vignette, based on misinformation in the BEP records. In 1952 researchers studying Baldwin's work diary found entries confirming that Baldwin was the sole engraver of the vignette, and Weeks had engraved the frame and lettering.

Marcus W. Baldwin (1853-1925) started his career at the American Bank Note Company, apprenticing under Alfred Jones and Luigi (Louis) Delnoce. In 1880 he formed his own engraving company, Baldwin, Gleason & Co., in New York City. Baldwin joined the BEP in 1897 and spent more than two decades there before returning to American. One of his earliest engravings for the BEP was the vignette for the \$1 Trans-Mississippi stamp, considered by many to be the most beautiful ever issued by the United States. Coincidentally, Baldwin had also designed and engraved a bookplate for Col. Edward H. R. Green, several years before the Colonel's involvement with the Inverted "Jenny" (*The Essay-Proof Journal*, No. 47, pp. 123-124).

The War Department provided the BEP with a photograph of a Curtiss biplane to use to create the stamp. No one could have known at the time that the plane in the photograph—tail number 38262—would be the actual plane to take off from Potomac Park on May 15.

Instructed to have the issue ready by May 13, the BEP was under tremendous time pressure to prepare the dies and plates, and to print the stamps. On May 4 Weeks began work on the frame die. On May 8

Baldwin started on the vignette die. After the engravings were approved, the frame plate 8492 and vignette plate 8493 were

made by Samuel DeBinder, whose initials "S.DeB." are engraved on the frame plate. DeBinder was a siderographer, the person responsible for transferring the engravings to the plate, using a cylindrical transfer roll.

The colors chosen for the 24c stamp were red and blue. Printed on white paper, the design was a patriotic tribute during the World War.

The bicolored printing was done in two separate operations on an older "spider" press, so named for its appearance. Unlike the Pan-American stamps, which had been printed vignette first, frame second, the 24c airmail stamp was printed frame first, vignette second.

For each impression, the plate was removed from the press and warmed to allow the ink to flow smoothly into the recessed lines. Before the paper was put into position, the plate was thoroughly wiped and polished to remove ink from the surface, leaving ink only in the recessed lines. The dampened sheet of paper was carefully placed on the press, and the wheel was turned to apply enormous pressure, forcing the paper into the recessed lines. Each sheet was removed and stacked face down for drying. This operation was repeated for the second pass (in this case, the blue vignette printing).

The sheets were gummed, perforated and, for the First Printing only, trimmed on two sides to make them the correct size for distribution. In the trimming process, the top selvage with plate numbers was removed, a factor which probably contributed to the inverts slipping past examiners. The trimmed sheets with straight edges at top and right also appeared to come from 400-subject plates, which led to confusion over how many invert sheets were printed and in circulation.

Human error in this multi-step printing process created the potential for an invert error. If the sheet with frame designs were rotated 180° from its correct orientation before the second pass, the vignettes would be printed upside down. BEP employees explained in interviews that the invert error also could have occurred if the plate were rotated 180° when it was placed back on the press after warming. Down the line, if the error were overlooked during the gumming, perforating and inspection process, the sheet might reach the public through a post office window.

The potential for human error and the release of an invert were very much on William T. Robey's mind in the days leading up to the release of the new bicolored airmail issue.






William T. Robey's Good Fortune

William T. Robey, a 29-year old employee of the Washington D.C. brokerage firm W. B. Hibbs & Company, was eagerly anticipating the new airmail issue. He wrote to his friend and fellow philatelist,

Malcolm H. Ganser, on May 10, "It might interest you to know that there are two parts to the design, one an insert into the other, like the Pan-American issues. I think it would pay to be on the lookout for inverts on account of this." The first day of issue was May 13, but the post office nearest to Robey's employer was the New York Avenue branch office, where the stamps went on sale the next day, May 14.



The clerk showed him three more, but none were inverts. [This account differs from those published in the days following his discovery].

Robey looked for more inverts at a nearby branch office, without success, then returned to his place of employment and told his colleagues about his exciting discovery. He also told the newspapers. The next day, May 15, the Washington Post reported the news of Robey's purchase of a sheet of "upside down" airmail stamps.

Concerned that other sheets might turn up, Robey began seeking offers for his newfound treasure, but the reception he received from stamp dealers was decidely tepid. Eustice B. Power of Stanley Gibbons in New York offered a meager \$250. H. F. Colman, a Washington D.C. dealer, first offered \$500, then raised it to \$18,000 the day after Robey reached his deal with Eugene Klein. Scott Stamp & Coin offered to sell the sheet on commission (probably hoping to sell it to Colonel Green). Percy Mann made a \$10,000 offer, which John Klemann of Nassau Stamp Co. called "crazy." While Robey visited New York stamp dealers, he stopped by Colonel Green's office, but was told that the Colonel was away.



Perry hoped to sell it to Senator Ernest R. Ackerman and attempted to obtain first right of refusal, going so far as to mail Robey a \$1 silver certificate to confirm the agreement, but Robey refused to enter into a binding agreement and returned Perry's dollar.

On his way back to Washington, disheartened over the cool reception his sheet had received, Robey met Percy Mann at the Philadelphia station, and the two visited dealer and auctioneer Eugene Klein at his home. Klein knew Mann had offered \$10,000, but he asked Robey to name a price, to which Robey replied he would not accept an offer of less than \$15,000. Klein agreed, subject to an option until the afternoon of the following day, Monday, May 20.

Klein telephoned Robey the next day, exercising his option and confirming it with a registered letter. On May 21, 1918, exactly one week after William T. Robey purchased what has become the most famous postage stamp in the world—the "Upside-Down Airplane"—the sheet of 100 changed hands for

\$15,000. As Robey would later recall, "Promptly at noon, the sheet was delivered to Mr. Klein at his office in Philadelphia, receiving a certified check in payment. Thus, within one week, stamps that originally cost \$24 were sold for a profit of \$14,976."

Shortly thereafter, H. F. Colman and Joseph B. Leavy, the curator of the National Museum collection, received permission from New York Postmaster Thomas G. Patton to search through all of the 24c sheets in the post office vault. Anticipation was undoubtedly very high, especially since many still believed Robey's discovery sheet was only one quarter of the printed sheet of 400. Package after package of full sheets were opened and inspected. All had the airplane flying rightside up.

Eugene Klein, who had been approached by Percy Mann and Joseph Steinmetz before Robey's arrival, formed a partnership with them whereby the profits from resale would be shared among them (as it turned out, Klein received half, apparently with the others' blessings). After securing the option to buy the invert sheet, Klein also arranged to sell it to Colonel Green for \$20,000. When Klein confirmed the purchase on May 20, he was undoubtedly certain of a \$5,000 profit for the partnership.

Colonel Edward Howland Robinson Green (1868-1936) was the logical buyer for the sheet, as Robey himself must have known when he tried to meet with Green in New York. Green's mother, Hetty, a shrewd investor and one of the world's wealthiest individuals, died in 1916 and left her \$100 to \$200 million estate to her two children. With his newly-inherited fortune, Colonel Green went on a buying spree, collecting everything from stamps and coins to jewelry and pornographic literature. At one point he owned all five 1913 Liberty Head nickels. And, of course, in May 1918 he became the owner of the Inverted "Jenny" sheet.



Colonel Green authorized Klein to break up the sheet and sell stamps to others, after selecting some of them for his own collection. Before dividing the sheet Klein lightly penciled the position number on the gum side of each stamp, enabling future philatelists to cite every stamp by its exact location in the sheet.

William T. Robey was never to own a single copy of the famous Inverted "Jenny." In many interviews over the years that followed his discovery, he never expressed a desire to acquire one for his stock or collection. After all, he had been given that once-in-a-lifetime thrill to discover and acquire the original sheet, and to possess it for a full seven days. He loved stamp collecting and continued to collect until his death in 1949. By then, he had observed the many sales of Colonel Green's enormous collection and undoubtedly enjoyed seeing his Inverted "Jenny" stamps give pleasure to collectors around the world.

The 1c, 2c and 3c are undoubtedly the rarest values of the American Bank Note Co. Postage Due Special Printings, although the sold quantities in the official records are relatively high. William E. Mooz, in an article on the 1c appearing in *Chronicle* No. 170, May 1996, offers evidence to support his theory that the actual number of true Special Printings sold was significantly lower than the reported figures. For the 1c, Mooz estimates 500 sold, but it is possible that as many as 400 purchased by G. B. Calman were destroyed. It is widely accepted that nearly 9,000 1c stamps sold as Special Printings were actually regular issues.

A Power Search review found only one other stamp that rivals the quality of this choice original-gum stamp (there are none in the P.S.E. Population Report).







A large quantity of 1c and 2c stamps were printed with an "I.R." overprint (Scott R153, R154, R155 and R155A). Additionally, a handstamped overprint was applied to small quantities of 8c, 10c and 15c denominations. These issues mark the first time that the United States had to resort to surcharging. According to Sloane's Column (Jul. 31, 1948), the Michigan Mutual Life Insurance Co. handstamped copies of the 8c, 10c and 15c regular issues over a period of five days in July 1898. Sloane states these provisional revenues were brought to the philatelic market by J. E. Scott, a collector and employee of the company. J. E. Scott reported that the company used 41 copies of the 8c, 66 of the 10c and 28 of the 15c. The Scott Retail values support this relative mix of supply.
