PERPETUAL EMIGRATION FUND COMPANY

EARLY MORMON HISTORY - WESTERN AMERICANA

The Perpetual Emigration Fund was established by Brigham Young as a means to increase the permanent population of his newly settled Utah with Church members who would do his bidding, by enabling poor European Mormon converts to reach Great Salt Lake City. It encompassed an extensive Church-directed program based on Mormon Missionaries promising fertile fields and wonderful opportunities on the western frontier in Utah Territory, to any convert who would sign a Bond promising to pay back to the Church the costs of emigration.

The organization was amazing, considering the times and the nascent character of the Mormon religion, - and included a shipping agency in Liverpool, England; chartered vessels awaiting full loads of emigrants; entry into the U.S. at New York City; transportation by rail to St. Louis; wholesale outfittings of covered wagons, oxen, and provisions at the frontier (in this case Atchison, Kansas Territory) for the journey across the plains; and veteran leadership by Church Elders, who maintained the enthusiasm and faith of the newcomers. Once in Utah, the emigrants could not leave until they had satisfied their Bond - and this had the effect of making the new residents captive, since the Church literally controlled the economy. The P.E. Fund was vital to the permanent settlement of Utah, and to the continued control of this area by the Mormon Church, and encompasses a little known phase of our western emigration.

Included in this original group of documents are:

- Receipt written and signed by the famous Erastus Snow for team and provisions to be furnished at Atchison, Kansas Territory (sic), and endorsed on back "Please fill the enclosed receipt the same as my order". Rare. Seven orders signed by Erastus Snow; including one handwritten, shipping four boxes of books to Utah Library and a yoke of cattle "if they live to go through" (the journey) to his wife in Salt Lake. 35 different orders, in amounts varying from \$30 to \$848.75, for oxen, wagons, and provisions including cattle, flour, bacon, sugar, etc., written by Snow's clerk and signed for him. One has Snow's handwritten notation appended relating to shipping "Doc Bernhisel's store and fixtures" to Salt Lake City, by no means an easy task in those days of covered wagons. Another is a scarce substitution order, one party for the original party. Plus three orders to provide a passage for a woman among the P.E. Fund emigrants (1 signed by Snow).
- Also four lists of settlers indebted to the P.E. Fund showing dates entered Utah, names including children, who they married (several polygamous), and amounts owed.
- One list of personal debts transferred to Brigham Young, Trustee for the P.E. Fund as a donation in 1860 for the benefit of emigrants from Denmark.
- Three estate records approved by court judges, showing transfer of decedent's clothing, sundries, trunks, etc., to account of the P.E. Fund to settle balance of passage and freight emigration charges.
- 1862 Memorandum list of individual whose payments were not credited to the P.E. Fund.
- List of 109 Danish persons, made by captain of a wagon train in 1854, of persons indebted to the P.E. Fund for flour supplied during the trek west.
- An 11 page trial balance sheet for the P.E. Fund for 1857. This shows many

interesting details, including names and amounts.

An 1871 letter requesting funds to support proposed Federal legislation to lower the immigration tax, with a note to Utah Congressman to support this. The Church had been paying the tax, and charging to the emigrants accounts, and would accordingly welcome any reductions in expenditures.

This fascinating and successful venture of the Mormon Church had other effects. For instance, the "jumping off" point for the westward journey was Atchison, Kansas Territory. In January of 1855 it had one store and two saloons. But by the middle of the year it had 10 stores, many saloons, and one so-called "hotel". All the results of the outfitting of the Mormon wagon trains.

The wagon trains usually followed the Overland Trail, thru Ft. Kearny, Julesburg, Ft. Laramie, Ft. Bridger, and into "Great Salt Lake City". Depending upon the weather, Indians, etc., the trip took from one to two months.

The 1855 wagon train represented by these documents was one of the last such for the moment. For a drought in Utah in 1855 caused a crop failure and financial hardship for the Church. As a result, Brigham Young decreed in a letter that later emigrants would only be given handcarts, which they would have to draw themselves, loaded with provisions and personal items. Bad judgement by some of the fanatic leaders of the individual handcart trains resulted in tremendous hardships and a high incidence of death and disability due to freezing and lack of food late in 1856. As a result, Brigham Young stood up in Church and denounced another Church Officer for formulating the handcart plans, thereby passing the buck in order to retain leadership of the Church.

There are a total of 56 documents encompassing 70 sheets containing 74 pages of writing, plus many endorsements on reverses, etc. - all showing the many aspects of the Perpetual Emigration Fund Co., and containing the names of many pioneer Utah settlers.

Philadelphia April 1871

Dear Sir

The Executive Committee of the National Immigration Convention in the prosecution of the work they were charged to perform have the satisfaction of its partial accomplishment.

The bills introduced to the last Congress by Mess^{rs} Coburn and Finkelenburg in the House and by Mr. Shurz in the Senate were referred to the Committee on Commerce and reported back favorably.

The House Committee was not called during the last session and for this reason delay in the passage of the bill has occurred.

Immediately, however on the assembling of the Forty-second or present Congress the bill was introduced by Mr. Coburn in the House and Mr. Morton in the Senate; the latter giving notice that he should press the measure to a vote in that body at the earliest moment. We therefore feel every assurance that the main features and provisions of the bill will become a law during the next session.

We also have the extreme satisfaction of witnessing as a result of these efforts a reduction by the legislature of New York of one dollar per Capita of the tax imposed by the Commissioners of Emigration of that State. This reduction on the
