My dear wife

The Emeralds sails in a few days for Salem
The Brooklyn for New York, they both leave
the same day, I have therefore written by both
Vessels as one of them will arrive before the
other and I know you would feel very much
disappointed if either of them should arrive
without bringing you a line. I have sent
you a long letter by the Emerald, as she is
bound to Salem & I believe is the fastest
sailer. I have recovered my health &
begin to feel like myself again. We
arrived here on the 24th and sail in a
few days for China. We shall return here
to look for New York and shall probably
sail the latter part of November. Nicholas
remains about the same; his bodily health
has rather improved. I have written your
father by the Emerald, and would write him
by the other Vessel but I have nothing
new to communicate. I have sent you
by that Vessel one large & four small Bibles
made from the same paper, the largest
is for your good self; the others to be di-

vided between E & M. Elizabeth & Eliza. I thought
them very pretty and as Capt. Egelston offered
to take them home, I would not suffer the oppor-
tunity to pass. As the fabric is very delicate, you
must be very careful in folding them, and in
washing them; use cold water and castile Soap.
The ones I have purchased for you, I think is very hand-
some. You must let E & M take the first choice, and
Elizabeth & Eliza to settle it between ^{them} as to their choice.
I do not know any difference except the figures, they
all cost alike, except yours, which was double
price, as it is made entirely of Persian.

As I am somewhat pressed for time, I must re-
quest you to remember me to all my friends.
I hope to sail, I shall be with you, early in
the Spring, if no accident occurs. I need not
say, how anxious I feel to return home, to enjoy
once more, the only true happiness this world affords
the society of an amiable and affectionate wife &
a young and interesting family. You must kiss
my children for me. Tell William and James I
set my things over to China, which I think, will
please their youthful fancy. I shall purchase
it. I must bid you adieu for the present
but shall ^{write} you by another opportunity in a few
