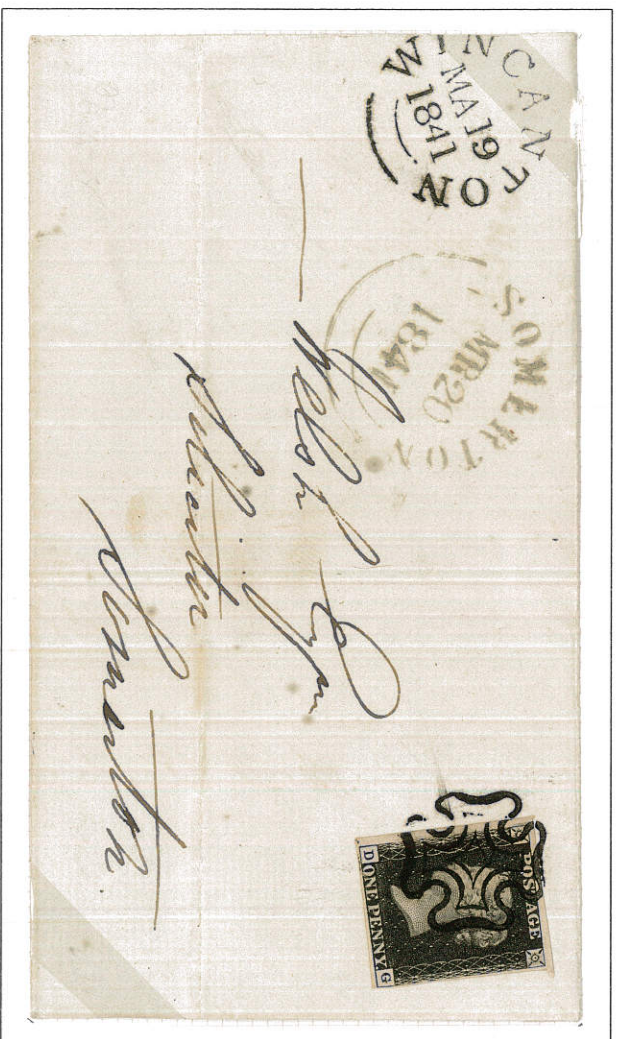


The first postage stamp issued by any government was that for one pence, by Great Britain in 1841 ("One Penny Black")

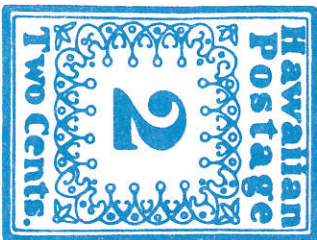


## THE BANK NOTE ISSUES

Nova Scotia No. 12



Prince Kalakaua was the Postmaster in the 1860s and got the impression the imperforate Numerals did not project the proper image for the Kingdom. He liked the appearance of the above Nova Scotia issue (Scott No. 12), and this led to the perforated Bank Notes with portraits of Royalty, including Kalakaua.

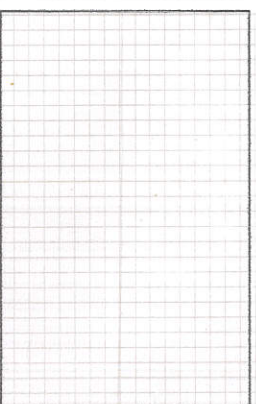
In 1868, the Post Office ordered Re-issues of the Boston Engraved Issue for sale to the many stamp dealers and collectors who sought examples of obsolete Hawaiian stamps. These re-issues were not intended for use as postage, although they were technically valid. Used examples are all thought to be philatelic favors. (From Post Office In Paradise website.)

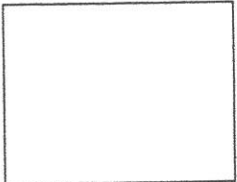

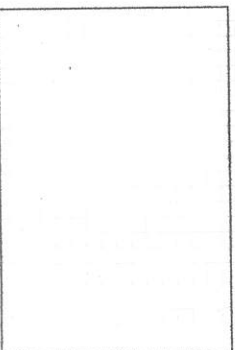

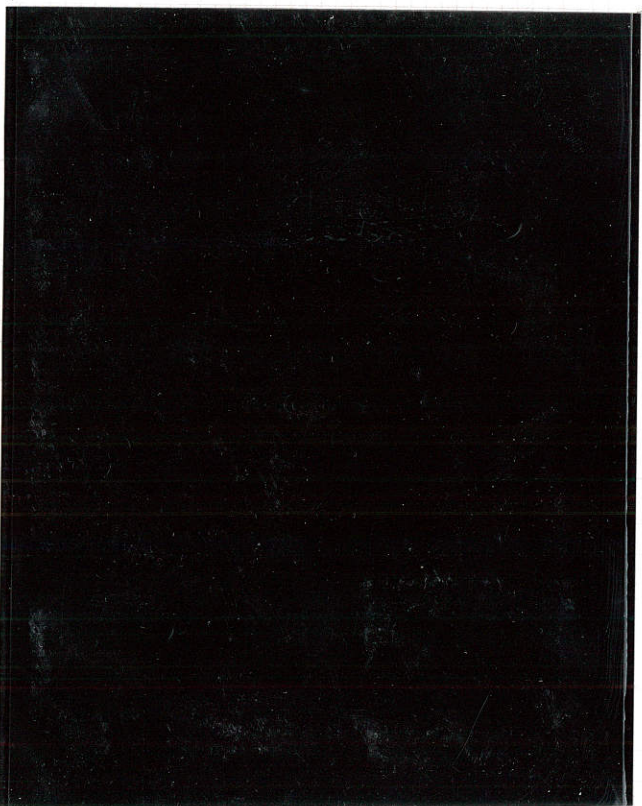

Engraved On White Or Yellowish Thin Wove Paper.

Ordered from Boston and placed on sale in 1869 at the Honolulu Post Office for sale to collectors (as perforated stamps had been available since 1864.) Cancelled copies are known.

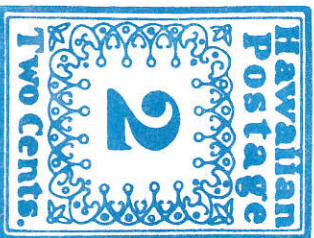

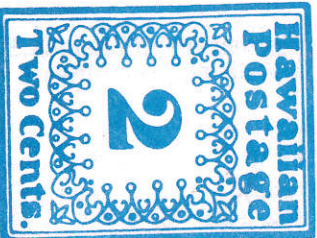
