






At the last minute it was decided to have printed some WILL ROGERS envelopes, with a fine drawing of him alone, to be mailed at Barrow direct to Claremore, Oklahoma. The inscription says, "This cover mailed at Barrow, Alaska, near the place of death of Will Rogers, August 15th, 1938. Third anniversary and Memorial Marker Dedication Day. Back cancellation at Claremore, Oklahoma, near place of birth, November 4th, 1938. 59th Anniversary of birth date, and Dedication Day of Oklahoma State Will Rogers Memorial." These will be the only covers for Rogers alone bearing both birth and death dates on the two dedication Days. You will undqubtedly want some for yourself and friends. The price is FIFTY CENTS EACH, necessitated by the additional expense involved. 
