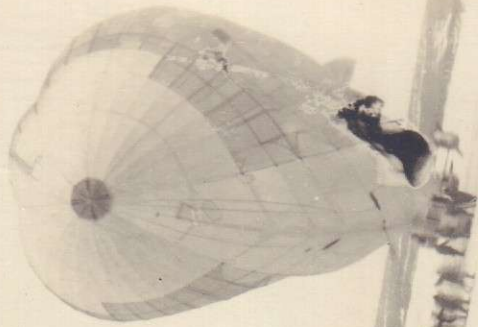

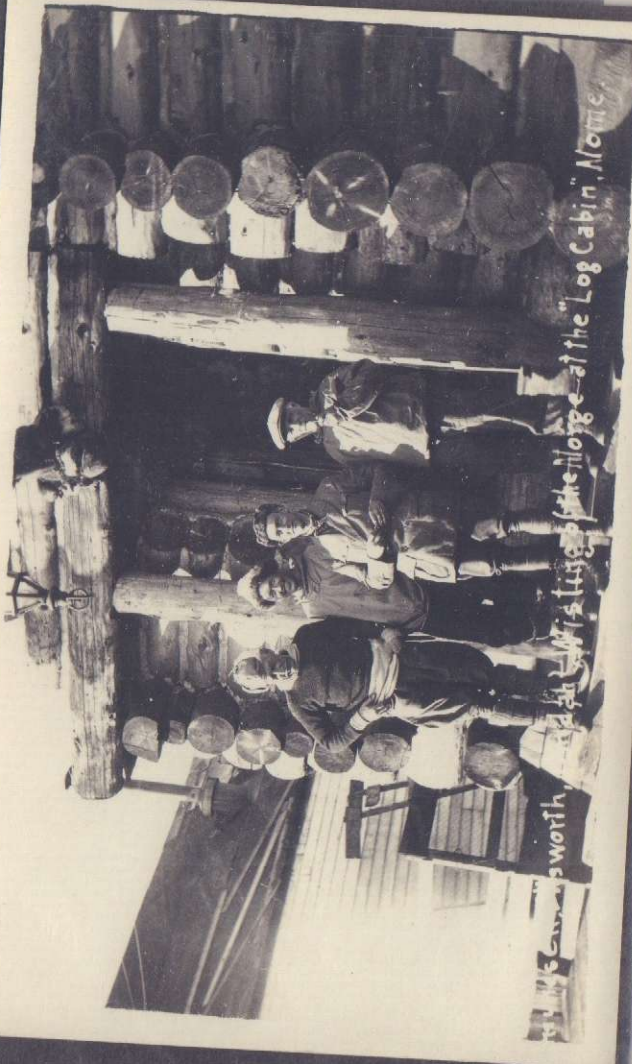

Dear Sir:

I am sending you, enclosed, a petition asking for a post office at Sheep Creek, near Juneau, which is to be called Thane, and that Miss. Anna C. Campbell be appointed Postmistress of the said office. This petition has been signed by a great many of the people who will receive their mail through the new Post Office, and are, at the present time, living in the near vicinity of Sheep Creek.

We are very anxious to have this post office as the present method of handling the mail is very unsatisfactory and uncertain.

This will always be a permanent town and at present there are about 300 persons to be accommodated by mail service and next year the number will be increased to at least 400 and a gradual increase over this number will probably continue for many years.

If early action will be taken in this matter it will be greatly appreciated by this company and also by the residents of the present camp.

As we are now to handle all the freight and, of course, the mail via Sheep Creek through the tunnel for the Perseverance Mine, it becomes necessary that we take steps to arrange for a mail schedule from Juneau to Sheep Creek so as to have some definite time when to expect and when we may be expected to make delivery of such mail to the tram, that the Perseverance Mine may have as good a mail service as it is possible to give them. I have requested the Perseverance Mine to have their mail routed via Thane so that it will save the additional expense of having this mail transferred from Juneau to Sheep Creek.

Will you kindly instruct Mr. Reedy what your desires are as to the delivery time and number of times per day that mail is to be sent to us for the Perseverance Division. I have arranged that the mail that is sent

Dear Sir:

I have your letter of January 4th, regarding the handling of mail from Juneau to Deep Creek or Perseverance over the new transportation system via the Deep Creek rail. I talked this matter over with Mr. Jackson and Mr. Cavelier and we have decided on the following arrangement:

All mail going to the Perseverance, whether regular U.S. mail from Juneau post office or office mail from the Juneau office, will be forwarded in bags on the one o'clock ferry to Deep Creek. They will then be opened and segregated and such mail, whether regular or office mail, that is going to the Perseverance will be placed in a bag and forwarded to the Perseverance immediately. This will include any mail going to the Perseverance from Deep Creek.

Mail originating at the Perseverance and destined for Deep Creek or Juneau will be placed in a bag and forwarded to Deep Creek in the morning. This will immediately be segregated and will, with such mail as may originate at Deep Creek and destined for Juneau, be sent to Juneau on the one-thirty ferry.

The Deep Creek office can in this way segregate such mail as may be coming from the Perseverance to the general office and see that it joins the Deep Creek bag for the general office at Deep Creek in the ordinary manner.

I have asked Mr. Cavelier to take this up with the postmistress and the men on the dock so that it will be carried out promptly and in an orderly and efficient manner.

Mr. Jackson will post a notice at the Perseverance camp notifying the time of arrival and departure of mail and such notice will also request that in the future mail addressed to the Perseverance will be addressed "Perseverance via Thane, post office."

Referring to the contemplated change in the location of the site of Thane Post Office.

I wish to call your attention to paragraph one, section #278 of the Postal Laws and Regulations, which reads as follows:

"The site or location of a post office shall not be changed without authority. Application therefor should be made to the First Assistant Postmaster General, when the office is of the first, second or third class,....."

There is no doubt whatever as to whether permission would be given, were the Department given a chance to pass on the question, as the new location is more attractive in every way.. However, I wish to go on record in the matter as notifying you of the requirements.

Before sending in my application for authority for moving the post office, I would be pleased if you would advise me if you consider \$180.00 sufficient to cover the rental of the office, lights, heat, and fixtures.
